Services such as Counsel Connect which facilitate easy communication between corporate counsel are obviating the need for corporate counsel to approach private law firms in a growing number of cases.

We hope you enjoy this edition of the Journal. In a future edition we will publish an article by Elizabeth Broderick comparing lawyers' use of technology in the UK, US and Australia.
