Interim Australian broadcasting planning handbook

Canberra: Australian Broadcasting Authority, 1995. ISBN 0 642 23376 4

The handbook is in two parts. Part One describes the technical planning guidelines for the planning of individual services that use the broadcasting services bands. Part Two details the technical planning parameters for terrestrial broadcasting.



The handbook also contains information on acceptable methods of computing field strengths, and other parameters for determining compliance with the guidelines and any other specifications of the transmitter licence.

The disabled, the media and the information age

This book is a collection of articles discussing a range of disability issues including the language of disability and disability coverage in American newspapers. The reality of the disabled in the workplace, the



liberating nature of new technologies are discussed. Also included are international aspects of disability issues and the promise of a brave new world of virtual reality for disabled persons.

This paper presents the basis for the findings of AUSTEL's inquiry into whether Telstra

is in a position to dominate the international telecommunications market.

AUSTEL confirms its preliminary findings that:
a) there is a



distinct market for international telecommunications services; and

b) Telstra currently remains in a position to dominate the Internet services market, but not the transit on international lubbing markets.

Closedown? the BBC and government broadcasting policy 1979-92

This is a detailed survey and analysis of a recent phase in the broadcasting history of the United Kingdom. It explores some of the major changes which took place in the 1980s and examines how these changes took place. It also tries to assess their significance for the political and cultural life of the UK.

The Green Paper launched a process of formulating Union policy on the liberalisation of telecommunications infrastructure and cable television networks.
