



relation to the licence. Full payment for the licence (price bid less the deposit) must be made by 4.00 p.m. the day after the auction for licence. The ABA will issue the licence as soon as is practicable after full payment is received.

If a successful applicant fails to meet any of the require-

ments, the licence will not be issued to the applicant. The ABA may then re-offer the licence.

If there is only one applicant for a licence, no licence allocation exercise will be held. Instead, the applicant will be issued the licence for the reserve price, subject to the requirements of the determination.

**The ABA has finalised licence area plans for television and two new community radio services in the remote areas of Central and Eastern Australia as well as 11 new open narrowcasting radio services in the Bourke region of New South Wales.**

# New television and radio services for regional Australia

The ABA has finalised licence area plans (LAPs) for television services in the remote areas of Central and Eastern Australia and has made channels available for two new community radio services and eleven new open narrowcasting radio services in the Bourke region of New South Wales.

## Central and Eastern Australia

These areas are served by the licensees of IMP in the Central Zone, QQQ in the North East Zone and ITQ at Mt Isa.

The ABA has not made additional competing commercial television licences available, due to lack of interest from potential service providers.

'Improvement of television services in the two markets is still a priority for the ABA,' said Mr Peter Webb, ABA Chairman. 'If the outlook for additional or improved services changes, the ABA will revisit its licence area plans.'

The changeover to compressed digital video (CDV) in the satellite delivery of television broadcasting in these remote areas during 1997 may change the level of interest in the provision of additional television services.

After the introduction of satellite CDV television broadcasting, the ABA will consider options such as additional licences or aggregation of remote television licence areas if there is sufficient investor interest.



## Main issues

The ABA's decision not to plan for additional competing commercial television services for the remote regions of remote Central and Eastern Australia is a result of the lack of entrepreneurial interest in providing competing commercial television services at the present time. The ABA is mindful however that imminent changes in technology or other factors may change entrepreneurial interest in the provision of additional services. If this occurs, it will reassess the situation as a matter of urgency.

Given the possibility the LAP will be reassessed during 1997, the ABA has decided not to permanently extend the licence area of the IMP service to include Mt Isa. Neither has it extended the licence area of the QQQ service to include Alice Springs. Both of these extensions were proposed in its discussion paper released in February 1996. The current arrangements, that is the ABA's approval under s.212 of the Act for retransmission of the IMP service at Mt Isa and the QQQ service at Alice Springs, will continue and will be reassessed upon application for renewal.

### Bourke

The decision to make channels available for new community radio services in Bourke and Lightning Ridge is contained in the ABA's final licence area plan for radio in Bourke.

'The decision to make channels available for community radio services in Bourke and Lightning Ridge follows interest expressed by aspirant community groups. The licences for the community radio services will not be available for allocation for at least one year. This will give existing aspirant groups time to consolidate and new aspirant groups the opportunity to emerge,' said Mr Peter Webb, ABA Chairman.

Any new community radio licences will be made available by means of a merit-based allocation process.

### Main issues

One group has expressed an interest in providing a second community radio service to Bourke, and one group in

providing a community radio service to Lightning Ridge. The ABA has decided to delay allocation of the community radio licences for at least one year to allow time for the existing aspirant groups to consolidate and new aspirant groups to emerge.

### Existing community radio services

The ABA has decided to allow 2WEB Bourke, the community AM service in Bourke, to increase its operating power and to extend its licence area to include Coonamble, Nyngan and Wilcannia. The ABA has provided FM channels for transmission of the 2WEB service at these localities as well as at Lightning Ridge and Walgett.

The ABA has also decided to allow an increase in the operating power of the existing 2TEN Tenterfield community FM radio service, and to extend its licence area to include the community of Texas, Queensland.

### Open narrowcasting services

The ABA has made channels available for two open narrowcasting services at each

of Bourke, Brewarrina, Collarenebri, Walgett and Wilcannia and one service at Lightning Ridge. The decision follows interest expressed by aspirant open narrowcasting operators. The licences for these services will be issued via an auction.

The plans do not include commercial or national radio services. A plan for these types of services was released in October 1996. The plans also do not include television services. A plan for television services in the Bourke region is expected to be released later this year, and Tenterfield (which is part of the Northern NSW television market) in 1999.

Details of the television licence area plans for the remote regions of remote Central and Eastern Australia and the radio licence area plans for Bourke and Tenterfield will be available for viewing at major public libraries in these regions, or can be obtained from the ABA by calling Freecall 1 800 810 241.
