been withdrawn and the presenter in question is now back on-air.

The ABA issued FM88 Logan City with a notice to amend their service so that it conforms to at least one of the criteria for a narrowcaster. At the time of this report FM88 Logan City had still not complied with this notice and the ABA is currently considering its next course of action.

Cool FM Byron Bay undertook to alter their service in order to meet the criteria for a narrowcast service. COOL FM has since applied to the ABA, and has been allocated, a temporary community broadcasting licence.

ABC Radio 3LO conducted a review which identified a serious flaw in 3LO's complaints mechanism and implemented new procedures.

KFM88 Kingaroy corrected the political advertisement, which it had broadcast a political advertisement without a 'tag' of identification or authorisation, so that it met the requirements of the

With the exceptions of FM88 Logan City and the continuing discussions with the ABC, in all of the above cases the ABA was satisfied with the remedial action taken by the various licensees as a result of the ABA's findings and took no further action.

Complaint handling by commercial television stations

The Commercial Television Industry Code of Practice requires each commercial television broadcaster to report to the Federation of Australian Commercial Television Stations (FACTS) within 15 working days of the end of each quarter, the number and substance of written complaints alleging specific breaches of the code. FACTS provides a consolidated report to the ABA.

January—March 1998

Commercial television stations reported 155 written complaints relating to matters covered by the code in this quarter. This is a decrease in the number of complaints reported in the previous quarter and below the average for the past eighteen quarters.

The number of complaints about sex and violence are down but complaints about bias and discriminatory references increased.

Ten's Melbourne News attracted the highest number of complaints (24) for an item on firearms which showed the wrong firearms, and a segment of 'The Footy Show' (Melbourne) considered offensive to Catholics. The Ten network reported no complaints about the program 'Sex/Life'.

In 18 instances, involving four programs, one program promotion and the placement of two commercials, a station agreed that a complaint identified a breach of a code provision. These instances involved:

• a segment in 'The Footy Show'

(Melbourne) which was considered offensive to Catholics (11 complaints)

- a promotion for 'The Footy Show' (Sydney), which was inappropriate for the evening G period;
- an inappropriate comment by a presenter in the 'Saturday Disney' program;
- two complaints of closed captioning not being transmitted when advertised;
- an inappropriately graphic drink driving commercial (G zone); and
- an M classified commercial broadcast in the PG zone.

Stations reported taking appropriate remedial action in each case.

In the previous quarter, 13 complaints were upheld by the stations concerned.

Complaint handling by commercial radio stations

The Commercial Radio Codes of Practice and Guidelines require each commercial radio broadcaster to provide the Federation of Australian Radio Broadcasters (FARB) with an extract of the record of complaints received. FARB provides a consolidated report to the ABA.

The figures and summaries below were provided to the ABA by FARB.

January-March 1998

Member stations recorded 358 complaints during the first quarter of 1998. 'Talkback and Discussion' continue to dominate the number of complaints received under the code.

FX the series, HSV 7 Melbourne

The ABA received an unresolved complaint that an episode of 'FX The Series' broadcast by HSV 7 Melbourne breached the Commercial Television Industry Code of Practice because of the depiction of violence within the episode. The episode was broadcast on 14 January 1998 and of concern was a scene involving a barroom brawl.

Relevant code

The code requires any violence within 'PG' classified programming to be inexplicit, discreet or stylised and appropriate to the storyline or context.

Decision

HSV 7 submitted that the scene was discreet and that it was stylised. It argued that the use of lighthearted background music and the use of the conventional 'western bar fight' with punches not seen to connect and with minimal blood meant that the scene complied with the PG classification.

The ABA found that the violence within the scene was clearly depicted rather than implied or discreet. The scene did not take place in a western setting but in an ordinary downtown bar in a time far removed in time from the conventional 'western bar fight'. Many of the punches were clearly seen to connect, and there was no evidence that no one was seri-

ously hurt or wounded. The ABA also found that the background music, whilst lighthearted, did not soften the impact of the violent images within the scene.

The ABA concluded the episode failed to meet the 'PG' classification criterion with regard to violence.

Action taken

This is the first time the ABA has found the licensee of HSV 7 to have breached this section of the code. As such the ABA won't take further action with regard to this matter. However, the ABA will be monitoring the licensee's compliance with this section of the code and may take further action if similar breaches are found in the future.
