New radio services for Kingaroy

The ABA has made channels available for five new radio services in the Queensland radio market of Kingaroy.

Channels for new community radio services will be made available in each of Cherbourg, Gayndah and Wondai. There is one known aspirant group in each area: Cherbourg Community Council in Cherbourg; Central Burnett Community Radio Group in Gayndah; and Community Radio of Wondai (CROW-FM) in Wondai. The new Wondai community radio service will also serve Kingaroy.

Two town-only open narrowcasting services will also be made available in Kingaroy. Country Classics FM, CMP Services, and TAB Queensland have expressed interest in providing open narrowcasting services in Kingaroy.

The ABA has planned an additional transmitter for commercial radio service 4KRY Kingaroy to serve Gayndah and Mundubbera. No additional commercial radio service has been planned for the Kingaroy area.

The ABA's decisions are contained in its final licence area plans for radio in the Kingaroy area.

Up to 8 new radio services proposed for Canberra

In a draft licence area plan for the Canberra market, the ABA proposes to make channels available for three new community radio services (two in Canberra and one in Queanbeyan) and three new open narrowcasting radio services (in Queanbeyan, Williamsdale and Yass).

The ABA is seeking submissions on whether vacant FM channels identified in the plan should be made available for either a new commercial radio service or an open narrowcasting service in Canberra. The plan also identifies a vacant channel for a new AM service in Canberra (although this is dependent on the existing community radio service 2XX converting to the FM band). The ABA is also seeking submissions on what type of service should be made available on the AM channel.

Capacity will also be reserved for three new national radio services in the Canberra area.

The ABA's options for radio services in the Canberra area, and the draft licence area plan are available for viewing at the National Library of Australia, Canberra.

Call for applications: radio licences

On 30 October, the invited applications for 18 open narrowcasting services in regional Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria.

Those interested in applying for any of the available licences must purchase an information package, *Price-based Allocation of Transmitter Licences for Open Narrowcasting Services* from the ABA, price \$40. (See back cover.)

On 1 October, the ABA invited applications for three new commercial radio broadcasting licences in Queensland. Two licences were offered in the Rockhampton/Gladstone market and one in Maryborough. The application period closed on 30 October 1998.

Bendigo community radio

The ABA has asked for public comment on applications for two community radio broadcasting licences to serve the Bendigo area of Victoria. The period for public comment closed on 21 October.

The ABA received four applications for the first licence (SL10257) from:

- Bendigo Aboriginal Transmission Association Inc (BAT FM)—Aboriginal community;
- Central Victorian Gospel Radio Inc (CVGR)—Christian community;
- Bendigo FM Education Broadcasting Inc (KLFM)—Senior citizens over 55 years; and
- Association for the Blind (RPH)—Print handicapped community.

Two of these groups, Bendigo FM Education Broadcasting Inc. and Association for the Blind, also applied for the second licence (SL1150008), which has a smaller licence area.

Community radio licence allocation hearing in Bathurst

The ABA is to conduct a hearing to assist it in allocating a new community radio licence in the Bathurst area.

The ABA has received two applications for the licence, from Bathurst Christian Broadcasters Inc. and Bathurst District and Community Radio Broadcasters Inc.

The hearing will be conducted by a panel constituted by Professor David Flint, ABA Chairman, and Mr Michael Gordon-Smith, ABA Member.

The ABA invites written submissions about either of the two applications received, and in particular on the issues listed in the notice.

In March and April of this year, the ABA held discussions with existing and aspirant broadcasters in the mainland metropolitan markets and surrounding regional markets.

Family web site

The ABA will launch a web site for families on 27 November, as part of National Online Australia Day.

The family web site will provide parents with information and tools to guide their children towards a rewarding, productive and safe experience on the Internet. It will include links to good fun and educational site for children, suggestions for productive family Internet use, information on technical tools for parents and protective behaviours for children when they are online.

The ABA is developing the site with funding from the National Office of the Information economy. The site has developed from the ABA recommendation for a community education campaign, in its report to the Minister for Communications and the Arts, *Investigation into the Content of Online Services*, in June 1996.

ABA announces new senior management structure

The ABA has completed recruitment action for a number of senior management positions advertised earlier this year. The successful applicants are as follows.

The Director, Planning and Licensing is Ms Jonquil Ritter. Ms Ritter is a solicitor and was previously Manager of the ABA's Codes and Conditions section.

The Director, Technology is Mr Bob Greeney. Mr Greeney is an electrical engineer and was previously the ABA's Director Engineering. He has been involved in developing international recommendations and standards for radiocommunications and broadcasting services through the International Telecommunications Union (ITU) and is the Vice-Chairman of the ITU Working Party 10B which deals with sound broadcasting. He is also involved in technical standards work with Standards Australia.

The General Counsel, heading the ABA's Legal and Control Branch will be Mr John Corker. Mr Corker is a solicitor and barrister and was previously the ABA's Legal Manager.

The Director, Policy and Content Regulation will be Ms Andree Wright. Ms Wright is currently the acting Director of the Office of Film and Literature Classification and will take up her position with the ABA on 3 November. She is the head of the OFLC's research program and has been a Senior Classifier and member of the Film Censorship Board. Before joining the OFLC, Ms Wright worked as an historian, a university tutor and a film maker.

The ABA has also appointed Ms Jennifer Stafford as Chief Information Officer. Ms Stafford, a previous Director of Licensing, returns to the ABA from the Australian Film Commission where she worked on developing their future strategic policy and operational directions.

Asia-Pacific Regulatory Roundtable

The Asia-Pacific Regulatory Roundtable held its annual meeting in Seoul on 15–16 September 1998. The meeting was hosted by the Korean Broadcasting Commission and the Korean Cable Communications Commission. Roundtable participants attended from Australia, Hong Kong, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, New Zealand and Singapore.
