Producers raised concerns at the ABA's children's television policy forum (and the recent SPAA (Screen Producers Association of Australia) annual conference that, since its introduction the requirement has ralaced a (see)

minimum licence fee of \$45 000 peer half hour.

Australia) annual conference that, since its introduction the requirement has placed a 'cap' on licence fees, rather than operatted as a minimum. This is preventing access to Australian Film Finance Corporation funding, which requires a licence fee of \$5:5 000 per half

The ABA has commenced an investigation and has written to interested parties requesting information. Responses are expected by early February. The findings of the investigation will enable the ABA to consider whether the rule should be varied ahead of the scheduled 2001 review of the Australian Content Standard.

The minimum licence fee requirement was introduced in March 1999, when the ABA was required to amend the Australian (Content Standard to ensure the standard treated New Zealanders and New Zealand programs no less favourably than Australians and Australian programs. The purpose of the requirement was to prevent secondary market programs from New Zealand displacing Australiam children's drama programs on the basis of cost alone.



World Summit of Audiovisual Regulators

The Conference was opened by Mr Matsuura, the new UNESCO Director-General, and Madame Catherine Trautmann, French Minister for Culture and Communications. Mr Grainger presented the keynote paper at the conference: the 1999 Spry Memorial Lecture, 'Broadcasting, Co-regulation and the Public Good'. The Conference brought 60 countries and their audiovisual regulators together for the first time.
