to comply with its statutory obligations in preparing the Melbourne licence area plan. Sundberg J held that the ABA had properly performed its planning functions under section 26 of the Broadcasting Services Act. In particular, the judge upheld the ABA's contention that, in carrying out its planning function, section 23 of the Act does not oblige the ABA to have regard to the content of the programs that particular broadcasters offer or that aspirants hope to offer.

His Honour found that the ABA had not satisfied the requirement for wide public consultation in section 27 of the Act. It was held that the decision to transfer 3AK to 1116 kHz and reduce the number of open narrowcasting services in the Melbourne licence area significantly altered one aspect of the licence area plan. The ABA had given the second applicant and 20 other interested persons an opportunity to comment on the proposal to move 3AK. His Honour held wide public consultation on the proposed changes required a general invitation to the public to comment and an opportunity to comment to be afforded to all individuals and associations known to have expressed an interest in open narrowcasting services.

No orders have yet been made by the Court. The first applicant, Nezville Pty Ltd, holds a transmitter licence for 1422 kHz in Melbourne. The second applicant, Harry Stamoulis, held a transmitter licence for 1116 kHz in Melbourne until 31 December 2000 when the spectrum drop-through and transmitter licence for that frequency expired. In the licence area plan the ABA moved commercial radio broadcaster 3AK from 1503 kHz to 1116 kHz. After a simulcast period of two months, 1503 kHz was to become available under the licence area plan for a community broadcasting service. Under the licence area plan, 1422 kHz and 1593 kHz were to remain available for open narrowcasting services in Melbourne. At the time the licence area plan was made it was expected that the transmitter licences for these two frequencies would be allocated under a price-based allocation system.

Privacy rules still apply

The advent of the digital era in broadcasting does not imply any reduction in the requirement of broadcasters to abide by ethical principles in broadcasting, said Professor David Flint when addressing the Broadcast 2001 conference at Darling Harbour, Sydney on 26 February.

'While we cannot predict the future with any confidence, the advent of a new technology, one which opens up a new broadcasting spectrum, necessarily requires public authorities to act. Now obviously some aspects of regulation will continue into the new digital area. This will be especially true of those rules enunciating ethical principles,' Professor Flint said.

'Just because news or current affairs is being broadcast by radio or television, in analog or digital, does not of course change those principles. For example, we would still expect news to be distinguishable from comment. We would still expect a proper respect for people's privacy. And on that, let me stress that intrusion into people's privacy which cannot be justified in the public interest is not acceptable.'

'If there are loopholes in the codes which seem to permit this, the ABA expects these to be filled. And until they are we expect broadcasters to exercise appropriate restraint in all program areas.'
