

Investigation into Perth community radio service 100.9FM

♦ The ABA is conducting an investigation into the Western Australian Aboriginal Media Association (Aboriginal Corporation) (WAAMA), licensee of Perth community radio broadcasting service 100.9FM.

The ABA's investigation is in response to complaints that WAAMA is not serving the interests of the Perth Aboriginal community. The complainants also alleged that applications from members of the Perth Aboriginal community for membership of the station had been refused and that the programming format contains insufficient material that is of interest and relevance to the Perth Aboriginal community.

The ABA will investigate WAAMA's compliance with the conditions of its community broadcasting licence, including:

- whether WAAMA remains a suitable licensee
- whether WAAMA continues to represent the Perth Aboriginal community and
- whether WAAMA encourages members of the Perth Aboriginal community to participate in the operation of the service and the selection of programs provided by the service.
