plan for broadband wireless access auction

In preparation for the auction of spectrum licences in the 2010-2025 MHz band for broadband wireless access (BWA) services, ACMA has released a draft marketing plan and accompanying discussion paper for comment.

There has been growing interest around the world in the potential of wireless broadband technologies to deliver a range of services, including faster internet access. Wireless can provide higher data rates over greater distances and can be more rapidly deployed

than current copper cable technologies. These features, combined with the falling cost of equipment, are generating increasing interest in spectrum suitable for wireless broadband.

To cater for this growing interest, ACMA has proposed a package of initiatives to support and encourage the deployment of wireless broadband services.

The draft plan outlines how the band and geographical areas are to be provided for auction. It will also provide the general technical framework for operation within the spectrum.

It is proposed that buyers will be able to obtain up to 15 MHz of spectrum in eight geographic areas (but only 10 MHz in Western Australia) at auction, with the opportunity to aggregate areas into a wide-area or national licence.

Safety measures for mobile chat rooms proposed

ACMA recently invited comment on a draft guide to measures that may be implemented by providers of chat room services to enhance the safety of children in chat rooms accessed via mobile phones.

The draft Safety Measures Notice identifies certain risks to children who are users of mobile chat rooms, and describes measures to minimise the risks. These measures include informing children and parents about

the risks, automatic filtering of chat room traffic and age-restricted access to certain chat rooms.

The notice is intended to provide a best practice guide for mobile phone companies and of chat room service providers in fulfilling their obligations to implement safety measures in mobile chat rooms. These obligations are contained in rules recently made by ACMA, specified in the Telecommunications Service

Provider (Mobile Premium Services) Determination 2005 (No.1). The obligations will come into effect after ACMA publishes the final Safety Measures Notice.
