And the liaison with airport security was easily illustrated. The day we talked to Chuck a Qantas

security officer was working with the team interviewing an Australian who it was alleged had stolen a considerable number of aircraft life jackets.

"When you think that that technology holds some 30,000 names that might bring us into action, it certainly keeps us busy," he said.
