

Commissioner's Message

It is appropriate that the theme for the 'new Platypus' is training. Training is vital to the effectiveness of any organisation and to the people in it. This is not possible if we haven't been given initial training aimed at providing us with a thorough grounding in our profession. The future training needs of the Force were identified in the Joint Management Review which was completed early last year. Since that time the Training Department has been developing these new training programs and conducting pilot courses. As a relatively young organisation with increasing demands being made upon it the AFP is still subject to change both in role and structure. Regardless of how good our training is, the individual members give the Force its direction through their leadership and ability. I am fully aware of the problems you all face and, although I do not pretend to be able to solve them all in the short term, be assured the groundwork is being laid now.
