

## OPERATION BULLET

**D**URING November 1986 AFP received information that 7.62mm military ammunition was being distributed through local gun shops.

Subsequent raids led to the recovery of 5000 rounds of ammunition.

Further investigation revealed that 15000 rounds of ammunition had allegedly been supplied by a serving member of the RAAF. A joint AFP and RAAF police search was made of the RAAF person's home where it is alleged further 7.62mm ammunition was recovered along with 54 empty ammunition boxes. Investigating officers allege that an Aladdin's cave of stolen RAAF property was discovered. They claim that 2.5 tonnes of stolen property was found and seized.

The offender had been due for discharge and had allegedly accumulated a vast stock of items for use on his 'retirement farm'.

Needless to say charges of stealing Commonwealth property were laid.
