Sergeant Phil Spence won the football kicking competition — and the job of master of ceremonies.






The eagle eye of Judge — oops — Chief Superintendent Alan Bird sees that all is fair in the boat race.

## CAPITAL PERFORMANCES

The highlight of the day's activities is the annual Henley on Pedhieos Regatta. It is our waterless boat race, novelty events and picnic day. Strict rules apply to the boats' construction and the judges are kept busy - mostly changing rules in true Americas Cup tradition trying to ensure an Aussie victory. Prestige is important amongst those countries making up the United Nations Force in Cyprus and each contingent applies the rules in its own special way when mounting their challenge. Will the Vikings (Danes) be beaten by those Swedes? How could the Canadian Airborne comprehend being beaten by the British Fusiliers?
