
Commissioner's message

This is an outcome the AFP wishes to repeat through our work with the Royal PNG Constabulary.

As a police officer, I have learned not to be surprised by the direction in which criminal enterprise can take, but I think we all must admit that *Operation Auxin* shows a most disturbing development in organised crime. The exploitation of children must rate amongst the worst crimes that our police will encounter.

Thankfully we appear to be making significant inroads into this area of criminality. Federal Agent Grant Edwards provided what I thought was a definitive answer when put on the spot about his past strong-man exploits and his current work by Andrew Denton at the Parliament House dinner. He replied: "I think the work I am doing now needs a different kind of strength, its a moral strength, an inner strength, and I am proud to be working with people who possess a great deal of it."

It has been those sorts of moments in this 25th anniversary year that have hopefully reinforced everyone's understanding about why we do the sort of work we do. Hopefully people have taken the time to reflect on the AFP's achievements and their own career highlights during this time.
