ABORIGINAL LAND RIGHTS (NSW) PROJECT

The Project is virtually complete and Meredith Wilkie's appointment has ended. All that remains is final changes to the manuscript of the study, <u>Aboriginal Land Rights Law in New South Wales</u>. It is hoped to to arrange early publication.

ABORIGINAL LAND RIGHTS (NT) PROJECT

The Project has funding support from the Australian Research Grants Scheme. Neil Rees and Garth Nettheim are principal researchers. Now that both have returned from overseas, work is proceeding. Daryl Gunter has joined the project to collect material and to help in writing up.

ALS FIELD OFFICER TRAINING
