The Speaker's 'struggle'

Question: Why does a newly elected Speaker struggle when escorted to the Speaker's Chair in the House of Representatives Chamber?

Answer: It is a tradition originating from medieval England when the job of Speaker was fraught with danger. Back then the Speaker was a key player in the power struggle between the monarchy and parliament. As the spokesman for a parliament that wanted to wrest greater power for itself from the sovereign, the Speaker often found himself in a perilous situation. A number of Speakers died violent deaths by way of execution or murder, while others were imprisoned, impeached or expelled from office. Today, as a symbolic gesture, it is custom for a newly chosen Speaker to act as though he or she is

unwilling to take the job. When a new Speaker has been elected in the House of Representatives, the successful candidate 'struggles' as he or she is led to the Speaker's Chair by the proposer and seconder of the nomination.
