Backslide on patient access to records

The Federal Government has shelved its proposal to legislate for patient access to doctors' medical records. It is said that this would be an unnecessary administrative burden on doctors as small business proprietors.

How can this be justified when thousands of law suits are issued annually simply to get the records doctors refuse to provide? Surely the administrative overheads and anxiety caused to the doctor (not to mention the patient) of dealing with a law suit of this type should be avoided.

Before the backslide was announced, doctors were arguing that the new legislation should only apply to records created after the date of the legislation. Does this suggest that doctors' record keeping methods will be altered henceforth? Any exemption of past records would have meant that any new law was seriously deficient.

School bus safety

The Queensland Branch has now secured APLA national support for its school bus safety campaign. This campaign was pioneered for a number of years by Rob Davis. It is hoped that with the weight of the national organisation of APLA behind it, some significant advances for the safety of travelling school children can be achieved. The major objects of the campaign are as follows:

- Mandatory lower speed limits in the vicinity of school buses.
- Mandatory fitting of large visible hooded traffic signal lights to the rear of school buses for the purpose of requiring following traf-

fic to stop when school bus passengers are boarding or alighting.

- Elimination of all advertising signage from rear of all school buses and mandatory placement of large distinctive school bus signage.
- Reform of Queensland traffic laws to require all traffic to stop when a school bus stops and placing a clear onus on drivers to give way to children while a school bus is stopped.
- Mandatory fitting of all school buses with seatbelts.
- Mandatory requirement that no passengers be carried on school buses other than in a seated position.
- Abandonment of the three for two seating policy for primary school students on school buses.

APLA is seeking a sponsor for publicity for this campaign which, through Rob Davis, already has the support of Parents' and Citizens' Associations of most Queensland state schools.

Injured Persons Association

This association has been in existence for a number of years although mainly in New South Wales where it has proved politically a very effective force especially in the field of compensation for motor vehicle injuries.

Given that there are certain to be further assaults on the rights of the injured to access the common law system for damages suffered at the hands of wrongdoers, it is in the interests of APLA members to encourage membership of this organisation.
