



New arrangements for Government energy research and development announced in 1981 have resulted in the closure of the Australian Atomic Energy Commission's Head Office at Coogee and transfer of staff to Lucas Heights. The Head Office Library's collection at Coogee was divided between the Commission's Mascot Office and Lucas Heights libraries.

Another result of Government decisions is the transfer to CSIRO of a number of AAEC staff, and their co-location with the AAEC at Lucas Heights. The CSIRO Divisions represented at the renamed Lucas Heights Research Laboratories are Chemical Physics, Energy Chemistry, Energy Technology and Mineral Physics.

The Lucas Heights Research Laboratories Library (or LHRL Library) is providing a service to both the AAEC and CSIRO staff. LAST YEAR a Special Projects Grant of \$11,000 was made from the Library Council of Victoria to Hawthorn City Library to investigate and evaluate the reference services of six Melbourne public libraries: Dandenong Valley Regional Library Service, Hawthorn City Library, Heidelberg Regional Library Service, Moorabbin City Library, Nunawading Public Library and Oakleigh Public Library.

In May 1981 Barbara Tout was appointed as Project Officer and after thirteen months of selected staff participation in tests, in-service training and up-grading of reference stock the project has been completed. Barbara finished her report early in July and handed it to the Public Libraries Division of the Library Council of Victoria. The PLD will be responsible for editing and publishing the report.

As well as highlighting the importance and future possibilities of reference services to the participating staff, the project has cre-



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ated a wider professional awareness of the existence and role of public library reference services.

It is hoped that the Project's methods of evaluation may have state-wide application as a means of testing reference services in other public libraries. Many librarians are anxiously awaiting the published report.

Representatives from AWA and AWA Computer Services also attended the meeting and the workshop. The Workshop was attended by 24 delegates from libraries in Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania, Northern Territory and the ACT

At its first meeting the AUUG elected an executive of four with a representative from each of the four URICA sites. This executive elected office bearers as follows:

Treasurer: Marilyn Beamish, Ryde Municipal Library.

Member: Heidi Dyke, Blacktown City Public Library.

The AUUG Executive will finalise a draft constitution for ratification at the second Annual General Meeting of AUUG. The Executive have also undertaken to organise the next National Workshop to take place in early 1983.

Many topics of mutual concern were covered at the first AUUG meeting but perhaps the most important was the scheduling of the development of live system modules. This schedule was a mutual agreement between AWA and the User Libraries concerning the priorities and expected dates of completion of URICA developments.
