en referred to it by the Commonwealth overnment.

The Conference received the report and proved in principle the establishment of a idget for the conduct of ALIC's affairs, to e contributed to on a proportional basis by the Commonwealth, the States and the orthern Territory. The major item in this idget was to cover a survey of conservaon needs.

ALIC also presented papers to the Conferice on conservation of library and archival aterials and on the Australian Biblioaphic Network (ABN). The Conference acpted unanimously the recommendations opended to these papers. Approval was ven for ALIC to prepare a detailed proosal on both short and long term requireents for developing a nationally codinated program for the conservation of orary and archival materials. The Conferice expressed its support for the continued evelopment of ABN and drew attention to be need for appropriate resources to mainin the momentum of ABN's development in the momentum of ABN's development in the sure its more rapid availability to oraries of all types.

One Minister referred to the backlog of ems for inclusion in the National Union atalogue of Library Materials for the andicapped (NUC:H) and urged that the ational Library's staff resources in this ea be strengthened. The fact that the Naonal Library was still providing the secretriat for ALIC was commented on nfavourably by one Minister and the Comonwealth Minister stated that this probm was being addressed.

Finally, one Minister pointed out that the pecific resource need for ABN was for it to excluded from public service ceiling reraints, since it was required to operate on basis of seeking full cost recovery. It was ported that the Library had taken up this latter with the Public Service Board.

From the reception afforded to the ALIC resentations to the Conference, it is quite ear not only that ALIC is being treated riously by both Commonwealth and State and Territory Governments, but also that ie library world is regarded as having its at together in a way that has so far escaped ie other areas of conern to the Conference. It is all the more necessary, accordingly,

hat ALIC's advice to governments be as

soundly based as possible. To this end ALIC is anxious that there be a full and early response to its Issues and Objectives paper.

With a view to making the papers and minutes of ALIC meetings available to those concerned with the provision of library and information services, the Council decided, at its fourth meeting held in Sydney on 9 June, that a depositary set of papers should be lodged with the State Libraries and the Northern Territory Library Service. These sets of papers, which will include the papers from the first meeting in August 1982, will contain the agenda, minutes and all papers cleared by the Council for distribution. Preserving local government records

THE RECORDS created by local government in New South Wales are not preserved in a systematic fashion. Council minutes and similar material must be retained but the rest may be destroyed after six years. Some councils try to keep more, others do not.

A seminar was held on Friday 29 April at the State Archives Office to discuss the reproduction and retention of various kinds of local government records. It was a notable success. More than seventy people attended, most of them well experienced in the handling of local government records. Another thirty-five applications had to be rejected. These will be accommodated, together with some prompt new applicants at a repeat seminar in July.

The seminar was arranged by the Action Committee on Local Government Records, a wide-ranging group brought into being after a seminar in 1981. It has worked closely with the Local Government Office (one of whose officers has been seconded to the committee), and is associated closely with the Library Association of Australia (NSW Branch) and the Australian Society of Archivists (Sydney Branch).

In no sense was the seminar a matter of preaching to the converted - or, indeed, of preaching at all. It proved to be a tough and thorough presentation of the needs of Councils in the retention of material and the attitude of the Local Government office to the

problems involved. The professional archivists warned of the difficulties of cost and equipment and a legal speaker considered matters of copyright and the reproduction of evidence. A battery of experts discoursed on microfilm techniques – cameras, reproduction, storage and retrieval. The final session of general discussion revealed the depth of interest in the problem and a general concensus that the need was greater than the obstacles. *Ken Cable*
