The 1983 H.C.L. Anderson Award, the foremost award in Australian librarianship, is to to Sir Harold Leslie White,)BE, CBE.

Now living in retirement, Sir Harold was Australia's first national librarian, and the ountry's senior librarian for 23 years. He vas a founding member of the Australian Intitute of Librarians and of the LAA, which ucceeded the Institute in 1949.

Sir Harold's long career in librarianship egan in 1923, when he joined the staff of he Commonwealth Parliamentary Library; our years later he became Deputy Librarian. In 1947 he became Commonwealth Naional Librarian and was subsequently inolved with the establishment of the National ibrary. When this became a separate entity n 1961 Sir Harold was appointed National ibrarian, retaining this position until his etirement in 1970.

The H.C.L. Anderson Award is named in honour of Henry Charles Lennox Anderson who was librarian of the Public Library of NSW from 1893-1906. Born at sea in 1853, he was educated in Sydney and a master at Sydney Grammar School from 1873-82. He served as Chief Examiner to the Department of Public Instruction 1882-90 and Director of Agriculture from March 1890 to August 1893, when he was appointed Principal Librarian of the Public Library of NSW.

He quickly mastered his new profession, with an influence on Australian librarianship still in evidence today.

It was Sir Harold White's outstanding contribution to Australian librarianship that led to his selection as this year's recipient of the H.C.L. Anderson Award. His achievement in collection building is without equal in Australian librarianship. Only after the scattered resources of the National Library were brought together in 1967 was the significance of this national asset, for which he had been so largely responsible, fully realised.

Teleconferencing for Perth

'HE HIGHLIGHT of a very excitng Information Science Section Conference will be a teleconferncing session involving James Iarker-Mortlock, of Harkers Sydey, who will be in New York.

'Information Delivery' is the theme of the econd National Information Science Section Conference to be held in Perth on 29-30 Sepember 1983. The Conference will examine he infrastructure to support information devery systems, the technology, the informa-ion facilitators, and the end users. There vill be a special session on electronic docunent ordering and supply, featuring James Iarker-Mortlock in a teleconferenced session rom New York.

The keynote speaker is Alan Singleton, Luropean Manager, Publisher Services Froup, F.W. Faxon. Alan has been extensively nvolved in various aspects of new technoloies, particularly the electronic journal. As a esearcher with the Primary Communica-ions Research Centre at the University of eicester, he wrote several recent British .ibrary R&D reports on the applications of ew technology to libraries and information ervices.

The special guest speaker is Joseph Becker, President of Becker and Hayes Inc., anta Monica, California, who will be decribing and evaluating the necessary techology for the information delivery systems inder discussion.

The panel on the infrastructure will include Ian McCallum, ACI Computer Services; Bev Forbes, Dept of Resources and Energy; Richard Rothwell, Dept of Science and Technology; and David Hawkins, NSW Dept of Agriculture.

Ian will examine developments in Australia since the first National ISS Conference in 1977. Bev will describe the Streamline database as a model for Australia. Richard will discuss the role of the Department of Science and Technology and David will discuss the Bibliography of Agriculture database.

The Information Facilitators panel features information providers who are not librarians including Barney Blundell, Assistant General Manager, Australian Associated Press to discuss AAP information services; Don Lipscombe, Lipscombe and Associates will describe the information services he provides to the petroleum and mining industries. Also on the panel will be Richard Barber, Manager ACEL, who provide a trade catalogue library service, Australian Standards on Microfiche and are the Australian Agents for the international engineering standards service provided by Information Handling of the United States. Bryan Kelman, WAIT Library, will report on the information services provided to technology parks in USA and UK.

The End Users panel consists of four regular users of the libraries in Perth: Peter Foster, representing the mining industry; Dr Philip Jennings, a user of Murdoch University; Peter Ewing, Orbital Engine Co., and Don Lipscombe.

The vision, pertinacity and political skill of Harold White were the qualities that brought about the National Library, its location, size and appearance - without doubt one of the most successful library promotion exercises in Australia.

Sir Harold is one of the outstanding figures in the history of the LAA, and he laid the basis for effective library co-operation in Australia through his acceptance and development on AACOBS.

Past recipients of the H.C.L. Anderson Award include John Metcalfe, Wilma Radford, Thurles Thomas, Dietrich Borchardt, Allan Horton, Francis Sharr, Phyllis Mander-Jones and Ira Raymond.

The date for the formal presentation to Sir Harold has not yet been set.

To round off the Conference Dr Pat Layzell Ward, Head of the Department of Library and Information Studies, WAIT, will examine the education of professionals involved in Information Delivery.
