

New school at Riverina College

A new school, known as the School of Information Studies, has been established at Riverina College of Advanced Education. It has been created through the amalgamation of the former Schools of Computing Studies, and Library and Information Science.

The new school, established to meet the challenge of advanced information technology, will be headed by Dr Brian Cornish, who has been involved with computers since the early 1960s when he worked on Sydney University's first computer, SILIAC.

The new school will continue to be responsible for the following courses: Graduate Diploma in Library and Information Science; Graduate Diploma in School Librarianship; Bachelor of Arts (Library and Information Science); Associate Diploma in Computing.

Three other courses are being developed: a Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications, Graduate Diploma in Children's Literature, and a Bachelor of Applied Science (Computing).

Museum of Australia's First Director

Dr Don McMichael, CBE, has been appointed the first Director of the Museum of Australia.

His 7-year appointment was announced recently by the Minister for Home Affairs and Environment, Mr Barry Cohen.

Dr McMichael has been Secretary of the Department of Home Affairs since 1980. In 1973 he became the first permanent head of the Department of Environment and Conservation.

From 1952 to 1967 he worked as a zoologist with the Australian Museum in Sydney, for the last two years as its Deputy Director. He is also a former Director of the National Parks and Wildlife Service of NSW.

Dr McMichael will be responsible, under the Council of the Museum of Australia, for developing the Museum of Australia on an 88-hectare site on the shores of Canberra's Lake Burley Griffin. It is expected to open in 1990.

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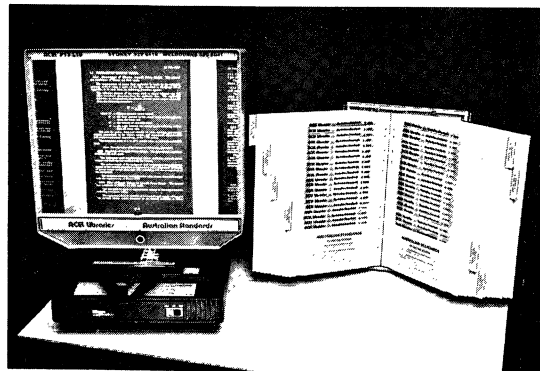
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Shopfront — a community project
