

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Futures Committee Report

ALL MEMBERS have recently received the report of the Futures Committee Workshop as an insert in *InCite*.

Following the Workshop the Futures Committee suggested some modification to its recommendations, and these were discussed at General in November 1983. The list of recommendations appeared in the August 17 issue of InCite but unfortunately three were omitted. The complete list is given below:

- 1) That the LAA should broaden its objects to promote, establish and improve library and information services to serve as the professional association for the new range of professionals involved in the provision of the library and information services of the future.
- That the LAA reflect the widened role in a new name.
- That the LAA survey information workers outside the Association to determine their needs and the support the renewed Association could provide.
- 4) That the LAA reassess the educational process required for the wider roles of its members in providing information services.
- That the LAA explore the means of monitoring the social, economic and political data relating to libraries and information services using existing data and mechanisms.
- That the LAA explore the possibility of making regular projections for libraries and information services using existing economic models and the data gathered above
- 7) That the LAA monitor developments in the provision of public and private sector information services including funding levels
- 8) That the LAA monitor the range of information products available in Australia with a view to providing technology assessment of them.
- 9) That the LAA campaign to ensure that every school has a trained teacher-librarian, as far as possible, full-time.
- 10) That the LAA support efforts to ensure that children are taught the value and methods of use of information services.

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GOVERNMENT PUBLICATIONS

The Australian Government Publishing Ser-AACOBS Liaison Committee met in July, discussing several issues of general interest.

Changes to the Commonwealth Acts Interpretation Act now authorise courts to draw on a wider range of materials as aids to the interpretation of Commonwealth laws. These are:

- any relevant reports (e.g. reports of Royal Commissions, law reform commissions, committees of inquiry) laid before Parliament before the provision in question was enacted:
- any treaty or other international agreement referred to in the legislation in question:
- the explanatory memorandum and Second Reading Speech relating to the legislation in question;
- any document that is expressly declared by the legislation in question to be relevant;
- any other relevant material in the Journals of the Senate, the Votes and Proceedings of the House, or the Hansard record of debates.

Libraries concerned will now need to keep all this material. These changes took effect on 12 June 1984, the date of a press release from the Attorney-General which will appear in the $Commonwealth\ record.$

An AGPS Charter of printing and publishing activities was tabled in the House of Representatives on 6 March this year. It sets out the role of AGPS and its relationships with Parliament, departments and authorities. However it is a general statement which fails to mention that some federal agencies, including the National Library of Australia, have exemption from using it. A serious weakness is that no sanctions are available to oblige agencies to work with AGPS, with consequent problems in the availability and bibliographic control of publications. Copies of the Charter will be distributed without charge from the Director, Publishings, AGPS, GPO Box 84, Canberra, ACT 2601.

Users will have noticed the AGPS Annual $catalogue \ of \ Commonwealth \ publications$ 1982 format has been changed to incorporate full entries in each index sequence. Naturally this has increased its size and cost, and I should be happy to pass on any comments on the format.

Finally, the AGPS-AACOBS Liaison Committee (AALC) is producing a Review of activities, 1980-84, which will be distributed to deposit and free issue libraries.
