Workaway — making work easier

For all those readers who skim the shelves for jobs and travel information — and for those who fancy working overseas for a while — there is a new monthly newspaper on the market that is worth having on your racks.

Workaway, which kicked off in Sydney this month, is aimed at people wanting to work in the UK, Europe, Asia and the Middle East. It lists hundreds of jobs ranging from part time housekeeping to top executive positions that are suitable for Australians to apply for BEFORE leaving home.

Take your pick from chambermaiding in the English West Country, working at a riding school in Spain, looking after two young boys in Switzerland or 100 boys at a private boarding school, being a works manager in Zambia, accounting in Austria, banking in Perth, cooking in Cornwall, dancing in Denmark... or librarianing (!) in Luxembourg.

It's the first of its kind; in fact, it is the world's ONLY international jobfinder, featuring six tabloid-size pages of classified-style ads for jobs overseas. It's also packed with practical information for travellers and jobhunters, including tips on where is the best place to get work at what time of the year, who to contact, how much to expect in wages and what papers and permits are needed.

The launch issue includes a feature on how to spend all summer cruising round the Mediterranean, the Aegean and the Canary Islands on luxury yachts on full pay, as a crew member.

We can then move to develop a consensus based on agreed information which is pertinent to the arguments we can all support.

The point to be established. That we *must* have Local Government libraries. That we *cannot do without them*.

The information needed. Pertinent dramatic demonstrations of this perceived fact.

CAVAL Appoints new library co-ordinator

Max is an active member of the LAA and has contributed to the work of AACOBS. He was responsible for the formation of the ABN Users' Group in the ACT and has organized a workshop on serials cataloguing. He is the author of a number of conference papers and journal articles.

BUILDING REVIEW 1982 & 1983

THE AUGUST 1984 issue of the Australian Library Journal will contain the third Building Review covering archives and library building projects completed in the 1982 and 1983 calendar years. Completed projects may include remodelled or extended buildings. Previous Reviews appeared in the Journal in August 1980 and May 1983.

Data forms have already been sent to authorities responsible for archives buildings and public, state, parliamentary, university and college of advanced education libraries, except where prior notice of inactivity has already been advised. Previous experience has shown that it is difficult to obtain details of other educational libraries and special libraries and no attempt has been made to cover these projects by direct mailing for the third Review.
