At its meeting on 27 August 1988, the General Council of the Library Association of Australia, conferred the distinction of Fellowship of the Association on Judith Baskin, Diana Oliver and Patricia Ward.

A Fellowship may be conferred on any Associate (professional) member who, in the opinion of the Board of Examiners and the General Council has made a distinguished contribution to the theory or practice of librarianship. The theme of the 1989 NZLA conference will be 'Making Contact'. This conference will be held on 14-16 February in Christchurch, New Zealand. The program will cover users' rights, information broking, performance appraisal, and a national information policy for New Zealand. There will also be updates on technology and contributions from prominent speakers such as Warren Horton (Australia), Dennis Lewis (UK) and Eleanor Jo Rodger (US).

Robert D. Williamson was chairman of the Scientific and Technical Information Committee of RACI and served as member of the Communications Systems Working Group of the National Library of Australia. He was involved in founding the LAA's Information Science Section. He saw the need to assist newcomers using computers for information retrieval and dissemination.

Put to test

The British Library (*The Australian*, 9 August 1988) is testing its own compact discs now that trials around the world have cast doubt on how long they last. The library plans to store large quantities of sound, pictures and text in digital form under a project funded by Plasmon Data Systems of Melbourn, Hertfordshire.

Plasmon makes optical discs which are believed to last for many centuries. But, the British Library is taking no chances. Three 'environmental ovens' are being installed at the National Sound Archive, South Kensington where tests have begun. The discs will be cycled through different temperature bands ranging from 20 to 60 degrees centigrade and will be checked every 500 hours for data error and again at the end of the test, after 4,000 hours.

Blue ribbon day

On Universal Children's Day, 26 October 1988, Australian schoolchildren are being asked to wear a blue ribbon to draw attention to UNICEF's Sign to Save a Life program.

The program involves schoolchildren signing a register and pledging \$2 to support UNICEF's global immunisation program. The register will then be presentd to the United Nations, New York. For further details, contact UNICEF, Australia (02) 790 1517.
