ADDA to incorporate

The Australian Database Development Association is presently an unincorporated association. Its governing document is its Constitution. This type of organisation has some advantages, but it can run into difficulties in such areas as entering contracts, employing staff, and suing and being sued. Moreover, individual members may in certain circumstances be liable for the acts of others in the group or for the debts of the Association. While these hypothetical occurrences have not in the past caused concern for ADDA, the Executive Committee has concluded that incorporated status would be of benefit to ADDA and its members.

The committee has therefore begun the important task of gaining incorporated status for ADDA. When achieved, this will provide a firm footing upon which ADDA can base its plans for future activities.

The Distributed National Collection

One of the enduring concepts to emerge from the Australian Libraries Summit was that of the Distributed National Collection (DNC).

The Australian Council of Libraries and Information Services (ACLIS) has announced a major initiative to further promote the concept among Australian libraries. The concept of the Distributed National Collection is not a new one, but if the DNC is to have real meaning, it must move beyond the existing ad hoc arrangements between libraries. The ACLIS National Council has prepared an implementation plan to bring substance to the concept of the DNC.

The vision behind the DNC is to maximise the ability of libraries to meet the information needs of all Australians as effectively as possible. To bring this vision to reality, attention must be given to collecting, bibliographical control, preservation, access and national coordination. As a first step in further promoting the DNC, ACLIS has produced a leaflet setting out these elements of the DNC and is distributing this brochure to the wider library community — a copy is included as an insert to this issue of *inCite*. The object is to raise awareness of the concept of the DNC.

One key to the success of the DNC concept will be the identification of key collecting strengths in Australian libraries.

To achieve this, the ACLIS National Council has approved the further funding of conspectus in Australia, on a 50/50 basis with the National Library of Australia, for at least another 12 months from July 1991. In addition, information is being actively sought and collated through ACLIS State and Territory Committees on the extent to which libraries have written collection development policies. The ACLIS National Task Force on Preservation will continue to develop national and regional plans for the preservation of significant collections. On the vital issue of access, ACLIS will continue to support a uniform national system of interlibrary loan, regularly reviewing ILL traffic patterns and charges, and setting a recommended scale of charges. A new system of Fast Track interlibrary loan is currently being put into place, and a brochure giving full details of the new system has already been distributed to all ACLIS members.

As the concept of the Distributed National Collection becomes more widely known and accepted in the Australian library community, ACLIS will continue to promote strategies which will facilitate its development. The technology which could underpin more coordinated collection development exists today: it is a question of the will of Australian libraries to support the concept.

Multicultural initiatives The UNESCO Network of Associated Libraries (UNAL)

In 1988, under the framework of its General Information Program, UNESCO established a network of libraries designed to foster international understanding; promote dialogue between different cultures; encourage multi-cultural initiatives; spread knowledge of minority cultures; increase awareness of international issues; and disseminate information on UNESCO's publications and on key works.

Libraries eligible to join UNAL as Associated Libraries are basically public libraries (including community or joint use libraries) which are prepared to actively promote the objectives outlined above, and to develop and maintain contact with UNESCO about activities relevant to the Network. There is no funding associated with this program, although it appears to offer access to UNESCO publications.
