The 57th Annual IFLA Conference will live forever in the memory of its 1600 delegates (or was it really only 1100?). The short-lived coup began and ended within the 'adrenalincharged' conference week. In spite of the tumultuous events, Maxine Rochester reports that 'the conference rarely missed a beat', and the closing dinner was doubly joyous in consequence of the end of the coup.

The conference had an important significance for Australia, as reported briefly in a Stop Press notice in *inCite* 14. Warren Horton, the Director-General of the National Library of Australia, was elected to the IFLA Executive Board for a 4-year term (see also page 6). He received strong support from the Asia/Pacific countries, Canada, the UK, the USA and the Scandinavian countries. He is the first Australian to be elected to the Executive Board, which is the policy-making body for IFLA. It comprises the elected IFLA President and seven elected Executive Board members.
