ASTEFIX: A cure for the student blues

Ergad Gold has some good news for school librarians (and others)



LEASE GIVE me everything you have on the Greenhouse Effect. I have to hand in a project next Thursday'


The Ozone hole. Plastics recycling. Endangered species. Toxic waste disposal. And many other similar topics.

How often are librarians approached by desperate students seeking reference material for school assignments? Increasingly it seems, schools are pointing students towards the use of outside resources, especially for the projects and assignments which are so much a part of education today.

The Australian Commission is also one of these resources. After extensive consultation with teachers, librarians, unions, educational authorities, and many others, the Commission has now implemented a dial-up information service which should make life easier all round.

Not another database! Well, yes. But one which is rather different. For a start it is very cheap-just \$10.00 a year, and with no usage charges

either. More importantly, it is designed to cater for students: they do not need a period of training before becoming a user since the search process has been designed to be

simplicity itself. And the information contained in the database is directly in line with the topics which are in greatest demand.

It is planned to have a broad range of relevant articles, numbering around 20-50, on the database for

each of the main topics covered. The articles will be drawn from a variety of sources including educational bodies; accredited Information Suppliers such as industry, government agencies and public interest groups; and articles from published journals. The balance of material should encourage students to read around a topic, learning to weigh up various perspectives before preparing their project report.

The new information service, called ASTEFIX (the Australian Science, Technology, Environment and Futures Information Exchange) allows full text searching and document delivery. In searching the database, the user can select whatever search phrases come to mind without being restricted to a predefined set of key words. In view of its simplicity, many libraries allow student to access ASTEFIX directly using a computer and modem located in the library's reference room, without librarians feeling obliged to spend time locating information for students.
