

Multi-million dollar extensions to University Library

Margaret Macpherson says the new building has trebled the size of CSU's library at Wagga Wagga

IM BEAZLEY, the Minister for Employment, Education and Training, opened the \$4.3 million extension to the William Merrylees Library building at the beginning of July. The four-storey extension is one of the largest projects ever undertaken on campus.

The Charles Sturt University (CSU) Division of Library Services comprises the University Library and the CSU regional Archives. Libraries are situated at Albury-Wodonga, Bathurst and Wagga Wagga. The Australian Graduate School of Police Management Library at Manly will also soon become part of the Division.

The Division currently services 17 000 customers including students, staff and members of the community, lends 434 000 items each year and holds over 400 000 monographs, 4450 current serial titles, and 113 000 non-book items.

Before it was extended, the building comprised 2790 sq m and accommodated 200 readers and 100 000 volumes The completion of the extensions increases the size of the building to 7570 sq m and its capacity to 450 readers and 300 000

volumes.

Opportunities for the delivery of information are enhanced by the optic fibre link between the University's campuses and thence to the world. The University is also a member of UNILINC, a network for the automation and coordination of services and for cooperation between NSW university libraries.

The University plans continuing development of its library services—it has allocated \$1 million

per annum for the period 1992–1994 to the Division to increase its collections, particularly in the areas that serve higher degree and research activities.

The extensions to the William Merrylees Library Building are only the first stage in new library construction. Major extensions of the Truskett Library Building at Bathurst and the Library Building at Albury-Wodonga are scheduled to commence in 1992 and 1995, respectively.

Rhymes for our times? Not a bit of it—this was written by George Herbert Gibson exactly eighty years ago.
