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career in the library and information profession opens many doors. Libraries, information and resource centres are found in all areas of business and in all spheres of government. These include schools, TAFE, university, national, state and public libraries. A qualification in library and information studies provides the entry level qualifications required to work in all these areas and to perform specialist tasks in a multitude of other areas. Some librarians choose to specialise in one of these areas but many enjoy the flexibility of being able to move between them.

The Australian Bureau of Statistics has predicted employment growth of 74.5 per cent for librarians over the next decade. In

the context of estimated total employment growth of 27.4 per cent this represents a remarkable opportunity for young people who choose to pursue library and information studies. These days we find a strong client focus within the profession and a recognition

of the importance of meeting the variety of information needs that abound. New technologies are used to facilitate this service orientation and underpin the strong demand in business and the community for relevant and timely information services. The growth of online information services, including the

Internet, has ensured that librarians are leaders in the field of information technology. It is this development that has helped secure such a rosy future for the profession.

One of the aims of this edition of our Association's magazine is to encourage librarianship as a career choice for young people. There are also positions within the sector which offer tremendous opportunities and these include library technician and library assistant jobs. We hope too to encourage our members to contemplate options for employment diversification.

ALIA has a range of publications to assist in making career choices. We publish a booklet that contains information about all the library and information science courses available at universities and TAFEs. We produce information about applying for jobs which aim to help you make the best impression at interview. Our Branches co-ordinate mentoring and professional development activities designed to ensure that the sector remains abreast of the latest management concepts and is well placed to service the information needs of our customers.
