Gold Technology Award for new knowledge management software

he Defence Information Services (DIS) Network has received a Gold Award from the National Technology in Government Committee for its innovative Research Information Manager (*RIM-r*) knowledge management software. The Award was presented at a ceremony held at Parliament House, Canberra, in March this year.

The awards are presented annually to federal, state and local governments and statutory authorities that have improved their productivity and client service using new software.

The Gold Award was accepted by lain Brown, assistant director, network systems on behalf of the DIS Network.

RIM-r (pronounced 'rimmer') is an Internet-enabled knowledge management application developed using the Lotus Domino software. *RIM-r* captures, stores and indexes both what research work is done, and how it is done and makes that knowledge available for access and re-use throughout the DIS Network.

Currently at version 2.0 and deployed in all Defence libraries in the ACT, later releases of RIM-r will be available to the entire Australiawide DIS Network to support their research-

related work. Other areas of the Department have expressed strong interest in the product to use in support of their key business processes.

The award-winning product is the result of a successful industry partnership between the Defence Information Service and an Australian information technology company, Random Computing.
