Discovering democracy in libraries

he Australian Library and Information Association is currently represented on the advisory committee for the Discovering democracy learning circle project, one component of the Discovering democracy program, administered by the Department of Employment, Education, Training and Youth Affairs. Discovering democracy arose out of the 1994 Federal Government Civics Expert Group's report Whereas the people... Civics and citizenship education: ALIA's submission to this report emphasised that the public library, as the pre-eminent community facility in most towns, performing important social, educational and cultural functions, can be an excellent resource for the provision of civics education. Whereas the people... subsequently highlighted the role of public libraries as 'settings for discussion of civic issues, access to information and other citizenship initiatives'.

The advisory committee is responsible for the development of two learning circles for the

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adult and community education sector. Learning circles, also called study circles, are focused courses for community groups, with all participants using a common resource. The aim is to provide specific outcomes for participants which will have an impact on their engagement with the wider community.

Libraries — and particularly public libraries — are involved in learning circles on a number of levels. Libraries sometimes provide the physical location for a learning circle and commonly provide additional information resources to participants. A potential outcome of one of the Discovering democracy learning circles, currently entitled 'Citizenship and public life', is increased awareness amongst participants of the magnitude of information provided by libraries. This learning circle explores levels of participation within the civil community in Australia, and the groups and processes which influence the Australian community. The other learning circle, 'The Australian nation', focuses on the evolution of Australian nationhood, the role of people within the Australian concept of nationhood and the unique symbols and celebrations of our nation.

Both learning circles are in the preliminary stages of development and are expected to be launched in the first half of 1999. Through its representation on the advisory committee, ALIA is emphasising the role of libraries as key centres of access to information and education, enabling citizens to understand and participate within Australian society. Throughout the advisory committee process, ALIA members will be consulted as appropriate.
