

Libraries to play central role in 'Connecting Australia'

Libraries across the country are being invited to take part in a new initiative 'Connecting Australia'. This program of activities aims to focus the attention of local leaders on the value and potential of online communications to their community. The first stage — a nationwide satellite hook-up into local areas — is proposed as part of 'Online Australia' on 27 November.

'Connecting Australia' is an initiative of L.O.E/Wells Presentations. John Wells has worked closely with leading peak organisations such as the Australian Council of Social Service (ACOSS) and the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA).

'Connecting Australia' is setting out to demonstrate the benefits and the potential of the internet and other communication technologies by bringing together leaders and policy-makers from within a community to take part locally in a two-hour nationwide interactive seminar narrowcast to a familiar neighbourhood setting — a club or other Sky Channel venue.

The first session of this event will involve a national satellite link-up from Canberra featuring speakers from peak national organisations representing community services, local government, libraries, Chambers of Commerce, small business, rural interests, service clubs and others. They will be joined by leaders in the communications technology field to share and explore their diverse visions of the influence of online communication on Australian community life.

The second part of this important local seminar will call on community leaders at each venue to discuss among themselves local is-

ssues. Each location can report to the national forum, with online feedback during the 'live' event as well as following the seminar.

Some issues to be covered include: Access versus content — which comes first?; Regional communications issues; Communicating for community development; Libraries as a local information hub; Strengths and weakness of the internet; and Y2K Millennium Bug and its impact on communities.

It is anticipated that most seminars will include one organisation which will provide a computer and internet connection via the phone line in the club's meeting room. Through this participants will be able to showcase local websites as well as viewing the 'Online Australia' portal site launched on the day. Venues with internet connection will also facilitate 'live' feedback to the central national forum in Canberra.

Each local community event will be hosted in a Sky Channel venue with meeting facilities. All local councils across Australia have received invitations to host these local seminars and to invite local participants. Other peak bodies are also sending out invitations through their networks. Libraries have a unique role to play in making sure their local community is fully participating. We urge you to speak to your local council and, where possible, to consider arranging local internet access in the venue on the day.
