orangamite Regional Library Corporation provides library services to four shires through ten branch libraries in rural south-western Victoria.

During 1998, the library developed an information technology strategy to move into the new millennium, with its information technology systems and network able to provide universal online access to library resources and the internet.

In the first week of March 1999 the Corangamite Regional Library completed the major development phase in the process of converting its automated environment from a serially connected hub of four branches to a wide area network (WAN) covering all ten of its branches. The new WAN uses TCP/IP, the communications protocol of the internet, to communicate.

As part of the WAN development, within the two larger branches of Colac and Warrnambool local area networks (LANs) have been established and staff are already reaping the benefits of being able to share files, printers and access to CD-ROM based information.

Not surprisingly, the changeover to the new environment was the culmination of months of planning and preparation

Early in the strategy development process, Marj Morkham, the manager of Corangamite Regional Library Corporation, acknowledged the enormous task ahead for a library service where the majority of branches operated offline and there was limited information technology skills available in-house.

The Board of the Regional Library decided to put the design, planning and management of the project out to open tender. The tender was won by Comsearch Information Services P/L with Susan Liepa as project manager.

Financing of the project has been assisted by Local Priorities Funding from the Victorian Department of Infrastructure, Office of Local Government to supplement the funds provided by the shires of Colac Otway, Corangamite, Moyne and the City of Warrnambool to the Corangamite Regional Library Corporation.

To achieve this new online operating environment and connectivity, the Regional Library has acquired a new server for its Spydus Library Management System application, upgraded to Spydus, totally re-cabled within the two previously online branches and changed all existing communications equipment to create an ethernet network running TCP/IP.

The implementation of TCP/IP-based communications enables the library to take advantage of an offer from Vicnet to participate as a pilot site for the Victorian Libraries Online Project which will deliver internet access to all branches of the library service — previously only four branches have had access to the internet.

The atmosphere within the library service and amongst its customers is one of excitement at the move from a limited service to universal online operations. The online catalogue is not only available, but is sufficiently flexible to present both a web interface for use with PCs and a character-based interface for use with existing public access terminals. The ability to gradually change from terminals to PCs is particularly important to a rural library with limited funds for new equipment

The redevelopment and expansion of the Corangamite Regional Library network has revitalised the interest of public and staff of this rural library service with the availability of online catalogue access, and online access to other shared information resources such as those available on CD-ROM.
