Opposition to library Bill

The Kalgoorlie Miner, 6 March

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Mayor Ron Yuryevich is rallying against the State Government's Culture, Library and Arts Bill now under consideration by parliament. The Bill will give the Arts Minister the power to over-ride decisions of advisory panels.

The WA Municipal Association, of which Mr Yuryevich is president, is concerned at the significance of the Bill to the public library service. Mr Yuryevich said that the Bill has been developed without the input of local councils who are the major financial contributors to local libraries.

'One of our major concerns with the Bill is that ownership of the state-wide public library collection will vest in one person and this person will ultimately control what appears on our public library shelves' he said.

Bill aims to annex power over libraries The Melville Fremantle Community, 9 March

Melville-Fremantle libraries are very critical of a proposed arts bill. Melville Mayor Katie Mair said 'The City of Melville would urge the state government to enter into full and proper dialogue with local government'.

Fremantle City librarian Betty McGreever said that the proposed legislation failed to recognise the stake local governments had in libraries. She said 'At the moment the Library Board is a statutory body with real clout. The Bill would see the board replaced with an advisory body with no real power. It would be a toothless tiger'.

Censorship fear for local library

Ms Hays said that the bill would give extraordinary powers to the arts minister and gives no set financial support for libraries.

Western Australian arts minister, Peter Foss, plans to 'streamline' the arts agencies in Western Australia. His legislation, called the Culture, Libraries and the Arts Bill 1998, aims to centralise the state museum, Western Australian Art Gallery and the Library and Information Service of WA — bringing the three separate entities into one 'super ministry'.

Under the proposed changes, boards of directors will be relegated to an advisory role and the arts minister can choose to heed or ignore their advice.

Opponents of the legislation are concerned that the minister could become the state's arbiter of taste.

nology. Whatever the reason, scholars are the ones suffering. Until now, the publishing has been a standard measure of a scholar's merit, affecting pay, tenure, and promotion.

Another, significant, concern is the importance of monographs to research and academic literature. Ms Colliers surveyed 600 books to determine trends in the kinds of materials scholars cited, and how much they relied on monographs — monographs constituted thirty-three per cent of the bibliographic citations charted, compared to books which constituted twenty per cent.
