ast month (*inCite* June, p31) we highlighted some of the focus sessions planned for *Strait to the future*. This month we would like to explain further how the focus sessions will be structured.

Focus sessions represent a new approach for the Specials, Law and Health Librarians conference. They are loosely-based on a theory known as open-space technology. Underpinning the idea of these sessions is the democratic notion that delegates have as much to offer in the way of ideas, opinions and experience as those delivering papers. We are sure you will agree that this conference has the possibility of being much richer if this wealth of knowledge can be tapped.

Imagine that focus sessions are a marketplace for information, in much the same way that the Web is. You have the same freedom to join and leave these sessions as you do with electronic lists on the 'net. Focus sessions will be round-table discussions. They will usually begin with short presentations and they will be facilitated. A scribe will note down the points that come out of the discussion and these will be printed and made available to all delegates. A timespan of one and a half hours has been allocated, but discussion will simply conclude when those involved feel the desire to move on.

While in practice these might appear to be loosely-structured discussions, they require considerable pre-planning. Their success will ride as much with us — the organisers, as with you — the delegates. We hope you will give them your support, take up the opportunity to share your insights with others, and walk away far richer for the experience.
