# Making news around Australia

#### Selected reprints from newspapers and magazines in recent months

#### Library wins award

Campaspe News, 25 May

The ALIA Awards for Innovation made headlines in the *Campaspe News*. Campaspe Regional Library Service was recognised with an innovation award for the creation of its rural depots. Library manager Susan Orr said that the council submitted a nomination based on its library depot service which had led to library facilities being housed in bakeries, plant nurseries and community centres across the region. The model means that even the smallest towns in the Shire had regular access to a range of current titles and publications.

# Library cuts force a call for a deputation Wimmera Mail Times (Horsham), 28 May

Councils in the north-west of Victoria are seeking additional 'isolation factor' funding from the state government to help fund public services such as libraries. At present funding is based on population, so when the population of a rural area declines the council in the area looses funds, but maintains the costs of running the library, and often the additional cost of providing mobile library services.

#### \$650 000 revamp

The Herald Sun, 31 May, by Michael McKinnon

The executive offices of the National Library of Australia have been re-vamped and a storm has ensued over the costs involved. The former executive offices were built in 1967. An estimated \$650 000 has been spent relocating the offices from one side of the Library building to another, and upgrading function rooms. The Herald Sun obtained the costing under Freedom of Information legislation. Director-general, Warren Horton has defended the cost of the renovation by saying that as the directorgeneral raised money for the library in the wider community, he needed an office appropriate for meeting high-profile business people.

#### Words of war on publishing tax

The Australian, 1 June, by Murrary Waldren, Terry Plane and Richard McGregor

As well as causing a split within the party itself, the Democrats GST deal has been condemned by the Labor party and outraged the Australian publishing industry. Deputy leader of the Democrats, Natasha Stott Despoja will cross the floor to vote against the package clauses which deal with books and newspapers. The publishing industry has condemned Senator Lees for reneging on her party's policy on book tax (Senator Lees stated before the negotiations began that a tax on books was a tax on literacy and that

the Democrats would not vote for such a

## Net censorship war not over: lobbyists

The West Australian, 1 June, by Ben Ruse

On 28 May a mock funeral was held for 'freedom of speech' to demonstrate against the Federal Government's Internet censorship legislation. The legislation passed through the senate and looks set to take effect on 1 January next year.

Industry groups have raised concerns at the ambiguity of the legislation, for example, it refers to measures that are 'technically or economically feasible', but the exact definition of what these are and what ISPs need to do will be left to the courts. There are also concerns that the legislation demands that ISPs use technology that does not exist. Filtering software is not reliable, and there is no reliable age-verification software available.

#### Book lovers read the small print on the tax deal

The Age (Melbourne), 1 June, by Kerry Taylor

Authors, booksellers and readers have expressed their dismay over plans to include books in the goods and services tax. Chairwoman of the Australian Society of Authors, Libby Gleeson said that authors and book sellers were appalled by the dramatic change in Democrats policy on books.

#### Orwell hint for Senate gag vote

The West Australian, 1 June, by David Watts

Most smaller ISPs are concerned that the federal governments *Online Services Bill* will make access to the internet more expensive and slower, while failing miserably in its aim to stop pornographic and violent content.

Mark Reynolds, director of Reynolds Technology took his protests further than most by sending all seventy-six senators a copy of George Orwell's novel *Nineteen Eighty-Four*. He was devastated when the Bill was passed with the deciding votes of Brian Harradine and Mal Colston.

#### Censor and be damned

The Australian, 1 June, by Dan Tebbutt

After a marathon fourteen-hour debate, the Governments *Broadcasting Services Amendment (Online Services) Bill* passed through the Senate and will become law on 1 January 2000. While no one in the IT industry is happy with the Bill, they see the final legislation as an improvement over the original proposal.

Some of the last minute changes will allow the industry to define content filtering techniques. Expected options would include end-user filters and family-friendly ISP feeds.

#### Critics read the riot act over books 'betrayal'

The Sydney Morning Herald, 1 June, by Lauren Martin

Australian Democrats leader Senator Meg Lees is under fire for her 'betrayal' of the promise not to impose a GST on books. Her deputy leader has remained opposed to the proposed ten per cent GST on books. The GST on books was 'the very last thing to come off the table' when Senator Lees and the Prime Minister hammered out their GST deal. To sweeten the blow, the deal included at \$240 million 'book bounty' scheme for the printing industry and a new grants scheme to assist Australian authors.

#### Macabre or madcap, it's all child's play to this devotee The Age, 29 May, by Karen Kissane

Children play. Even in the Nazi concentration camps the Jewish children played. It helps them deal with the situation they happen to be in. Dr June Factor, who has been studying Australian children's games and folklore for twenty-five years has donated the endeavours of her research — a collection of mementos of children's play, lists of children's games, rhymes, riddles, jokes and superstitions, as well as photographs, audio and video tapes and play-things — to Museum Victoria.

#### Censor bill 'violates' pact

The Australian, 25 May, by James Riley and Dan Tebbutt

American Senator Ron Wyden called on the Australian government to scrap their proposed *Broadcasting Services Amendment (Online Services) Bill* as it would violate a bilateral agreement on e-commerce recently signed by the American President and Australian Prime Minister. The Senator was critical of the Government's plan to put international web content under the control

of the Australian Broadcasting Authority. He also pointed out that the efforts of the Chinese and Singapore governments had failed to regulate the content of the internet.

#### Libraries facing a catch up situation The Stawell Times News, 18 May

Libraries throughout the Wimmera region continue to play a catch-up game with annual budgets. Each year the Wimmera Regional Library Service receives funding from the State Government through the Shire Council. The proposed increase in Council contribution to the library is five per cent over and above what was paid last year.

# Automation frees up librarians The Great Southern Herald, 12 May

The Katanning Library has gone high-tech with its switch to automation. The library now uses computers to track books and borrower details, cutting the time it takes to record these details by hand. The new system will free library staff to spend more time on reader services, children's activities, displays and so on.

# Fight to save library funding The Northern District Times, 12 May

More than \$150 000 could be cut from the Parramatta Library budget under the Parramatta Council's draft budget and management plan for 1999/2000 — the cuts would slash the buying power of the library by about 6000 titles.
