Recent library appointments in Australia and overseas

Tom Girke has left Monash University's Medical School Library at the Alfred Hospital to become librarian-in-charge at the Ludwick Cancer Research Insitute in Roval Parade, Parkville.

Sue McKnight is now senior associate assisting the deputy vice-chancellor, Deakin University. This is an interim appointment while the university fills a new position of deputy vice-president (academic). Helen Livingston will be acting university librarian.

Erik Finger has been reappointed as chairman of the State Library of Queensland Board. He is joined by author and academic, Jackie Huggins; writer and critic Sue Gough; and government representative Keven Radbourne; all of whom served on the previous board. Five new members have been appointed: Diane Vance, director of community and cultural services at Thuringowa; Anne Bunnell, Townsville City councillor; Terence Callaghan, the community representative from Southport; Eric Bigby, the deputy director-general of the Department of Premier and Cabinet; and Susan Richer, youth arts and cultural development advocate. All appointments are for a three-year period.

Minister of Canadian Heritage, Sheila Copps announced recently the appointments of Roch Carrier as national librarian of Canada and Ian Wilson to the position of national archivist of Canada.

Roch Carrier will replace the current national librarian, Marianne Scott, who has held the position since 1984. Internationally renowned author and Officer of the Order of Canada, Mr Carrier has been active in various cultural organisations such as the Theatre du Nouveau Monde and the Canada Council for the Arts, where he served as president from 1979 to 1981 and as director from 1994 to 1997.

While the Canadian Library Association (CLA) disagrees with the decision to appoint a non-librarian to the position of national librarian, it recognises that Mr Carrier is an experienced administrator of several cultural organisations. The Association will seek to work actively with him and the staff of the National Library towards the development of the National Library's goals for the new millenium. The CLA Executive Council is now reviewing the recommendations contained within the report entitled The role of the National Archives of Canada and the National Library of Canada (John English) and will prepare a response which hopes to communicate its opposition to the government's decision to appoint a non-librarian to the position, and to express serious concern over the lack of consultation in the appointment process.

Ian Wilson has been the archivist of Ontario since 1986. He has served as adjunct associate professor, Faculties of Information Studies and Graduate Studies at the University of Toronto and is currently a member of the Ontario Government's Information and Information Technology Management Committee.
