Katherine Public Library – one year on

It is approximately one year since the 1998 Australia Day flooding decimated Katherine in the Northern Territory. Katherine Public Library was not spared and we lost half of our book-stock as well as carpeting and furniture. It will take a long time for complete recovery to be effected.

Whilst I have endeavoured to personally thank as many libraries as possible for the many donations we have received, I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank the library community around Australia for the support provided in the aftermath of the flood. We have received a wealth of donations during the course of the year which has facilitated our recovery.

The generosity of spirit that has been demonstrated serves to illustrate that the Australian library community is indeed a community in the true sense of the word.

I would particularly like to thank Haydee Adel, library manager of the Alice Springs Public Library and Theresa Jude, chief librarian of the Darwin Public Libraries, for the relief effort they organised within the Northern Territory.

There have been some positive effects from the flooding though, and it is to these issues that we now direct our efforts. The flooding has forced us to re-focus the direction of the services we offer to the public. In other words, we have become more client focussed in our restructuring of library services with emphasis on customer service. It also means that our collection development policy now reflects this client focus.

Katherine Public Library will be relocating to new premises in early February, after spending a year 'camped' at the Katherine Town Council Civic Centre. We are looking forward to this relocation as the central business district shopfront location will ensure that we will be providing effective access to library services for the public.

We have not been immune to the changes currently facing the library profession, particularly in relation to technology and funding. The flood has forced us to focus on these issues considerably earlier than perhaps would have occurred during the normal course of events. I would not however, recommend that flooding be recognised as a technique to facilitate downsizing!

Once again, I would like to offer my sincere thanks to the library community who rallied to our assistance with donations and wishes of goodwill in the aftermath of the worst flood in Katherine's history. It is to be hoped that the Katherine River obliges us by remaining within the confines of its banks during the coming wet season.


