#### Council books borrowers

The level of library crime in the Maroochy Shire has fallen by seventy-five percent over the last two years after the local council resolved to take court action to retrieve overdue items.

However, the council's overdue book policy was placed under the spotlight when the *Sunshine Coast Daily* revealed that a young mum had been left with a court conviction and \$150 in fines over an \$8.80 book. The library sends five reminder letters to tardy borrowers before issuing a summons if the missing items were not returned. The young mum in question did not receive these letters as she was living in safe houses, on the run from her former de facto.

### National Library brings Captain Cook's journeys to life on CD ROM

A CD-ROM, compiled with the help of sixty libraries and museums around the world is on display at the National Library. The CD-ROM, *Endeavour: Captain Cook's Journal 1768–71* includes images of the full handwritten text of Cook's journal, as well as a typed transcript of his writings, the first time both have appeared together.

Cook's entries are joined by hundreds of Joseph Banks' botany images, maps from before and after the voyage, and a virtual tour of a replica of the Endeavour.

The CD-ROM was produced by the National Library and the National Maritime Museum in Sydney using their resources and those of other institutions, including the Natural History Museum in London.

The CD-ROM, which will be available for purchase from early February is the feature of a series of lectures at the library each weekday until the end of January.

### Newton's last law: never leave anything to a uni

Keele University Library in England is under fire for selling a collection of rare books and manuscripts which had been donated to the university for the benefit of students. The collection consisted of 1400 books and pamphlets, including the first three editions of Newton's *Principia Mathematica*, and eight books from Newton's library.

University librarian, Martin Phillips, would not say whether he approved of the sale, but said other academic institutions had been contacted before the collection was sold.

#### Library with 'the lot'

Chelsea Independent, 7 December 1998

The new Chelsea library and information centre was opened recently. The centre is the first expansion of the Chelsea library since its opening in February 1973.

The new centre includes the library, council customer service centre, family services, community information and support services and the Chelsea toy library.

Mayor of Kingston, Ron Brownless said that libraries today are more than just books and the new library combines high tech with 'high touch' by not only expanding the traditional materials, but offering a wide-range of recreational and education materials and formats including audiovisual, multi-media, CD-ROMs, videos, magazines, newspapers and books.

Increased technology training opportunities are also available for patrons with a bank of internet capable computers available for group and individual training sessions.

### Obituary: Mary Baillieu, AM Patron of the arts

The Age (Melbourne), 15 December 1998

Mary Baillieu 8 August 1918 – 29 November 1998. With the death of Mary Baillieu Australia lost a talented, charismatic, influential and much-loved figure.

Mary was an active contributor and enthusiast of the arts and was a founding donor to the National Gallery of Australia, involved with the National Gallery of Victoria and an early member of the National Gallery Society. She was also a patron of the Australian Ballet, Opera Australia, and the Victoria State Opera, a friend of the Victorian Tapestry Workshop and a member of the Royal Melbourne Hospital's community council.

She joined the Friends of the La Trobe Library in 1969. In 1986 she was appointed to the Library Council of Victoria (later the Council of the State Library of Victoria) and chaired the promotions and fund-raising committee. Mary's aim was for the library to become recognised as the historical and cultural centre of Victoria.

In 1991 her contribution to the library was recognised when she became the council's only emeritus member, and a 'chair in history' was dedicated to her in the domed reading room. Further recognition came in 1993 when she received an award in the Order of Australia.

#### Free internet access at region's libraries

South-West libraries will provide free public internet access after a State Government grant of \$3.5 million was awarded for regional library online services.

#### Authors cautious as the Net profits

The National Tertiary Education Union (NTEU) has flagged copyright protection for academic publishing as an issue to be addressed. The union will work with other bodies representing copyright creators to develop a model agreement recognising the interest of authors, editors, publishers and users.

The practice of acquiring copyright has come under fire in the United Kingdom, with the Author's Licensing and Collecting Society campaigning to persuade academic authors to withhold publishing rights, especially all electronic rights, from publishers.

Dr Julie Wells, NTEU policy and research officer, says we should question whether online publication is the inevitable destination of academic work. She suggests that those who promote it on the basis of accessibility should consider the implications of the increasing costs of information technology.
