## University of Queensland backs a winner

t a prestigious ceremony in Canberra in November 1998, the federal Minister for Education, Training and Youth Affairs, Dr David Kemp, awarded three University Teaching Awards to the University of Queensland.

Two were for individual teachers of excellence, Associate Professors Doune McDonald (Human Movements) and Laurie Walsh (Dentistry). However, the third was in the Institutional Awards category for 'services to Australian students' and was won jointly by the University of Queensland Library for its 'Cybrary' submission and the University of Tasmania for its Student Centre.


University of Queensland librarian, Janine Schmidt, was honoured to accept on behalf of the library this award of excellence, which recognises outstanding achievement in services that benefit students and the community. 'It is a great tribute to the quality of our staff and facilities that we can provide such a good service,' she said.

The winning entry detailed how the University of Queensland Cybrary works, demonstrating that students can choose the space, the place, the pace and the time in which to work and discover shortcuts to scholarship.

The University of Queensland's *Cybrary* – Australia's first – integrates state-of-the-art information technology with traditional services to create a 'virtual library' in a 'wired university'. From any of hundreds of high-end Pentium computers within the library, and day and night from home or office, students can explore the world of information as they wish.

There is access to lecture notes, reading lists, past exam papers, *WebCT* work-book programs, the library catalogue, the internet, university handbooks, as well as general research and information skills tips, all from the easily navigable Cybrary Homepage. Students can also conduct standard library requests such as extending loans and reserving material electronically.

The Cybrary is an indispensable, integrated approach to meet the information demands of life-long learning and problembased teaching. It is a powerful support for flexible learning and enhancement to flexible teaching, and has been specifically designed for first-time university students.



The University of Queensland Library is the state's largest, with thirteen branch libraries containing 1.8 million volumes, including 11 000 videos, 20 000 journal titles, extensive microform, multimedia, digital and primary source collections. Stretched from endto-end the collections would reach from Brisbane to the Gold Coast.

However, Mrs Schmidt said that bigger did not necessarily mean better for students, as the library size could be quite confusing.

'The Cybrary was developed to remedy this situation,' she said. 'The library has taken a leadership role in applying this innovative approach to address the real needs of students in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. We have worked collaboratively with students and teachers to develop and refine the Cybrary as new possibilities open.'
