Strategic plan in action

Helen Hayes, president of CAUL outlines innovative projects underway

n March 1999 CAUL adopted a new strategic plan. Since then progress has been made on many aspects of the plan. ALIA members may find the following interesting.

Improve opportunities for cost-efficient purchase and licensing of electronic information resources through CEIRC (the CAUL Electronic Information Resources Committee). New agreements with Chemical Abstracts Service, the American Mathematical Society, the Association for Computing Machinery, Lexis-Nexis and ISA-RoweCom Australia have been concluded. CEIRC is currently negotiating its participation in the consortium led by Solinet for access to McGraw-Hill's AccessScience. CEIRC is also reviewing its intra-consortium cost-sharing models.

Establish a framework and develop a business model for a national universities borrowing scheme. An issues paper and a summary of current reciprocal borrowing schemes have been prepared.

Develop a business plan and funding model for a national co-operative digital and archive store linking regional stores under a common management and technical structure. Agreement has been reached with the two regional stores, CAVAL and SAUL, to work with them on national protocols. The working name of the proposed entity is Research Resources Australia.

Develop subject gateways for information access and delivery through collaborative development. The following gateways have been established: http://metachem.ch.adfa.edu.au/; http://www.agrigate.edu.au/; http://avel.library.uq.edu.au/.

Assess the feasibility of a co-operative approach to collection development and re-

source sharing for university and other major research libraries (Janus Project). Phase I of the program highlighted the complexity of the national research library network, and difficulty of mapping the multitude of discrete but connected activities into an overarching business model for research libraries. Phase II of the project will consequently not proceed, and CAUL is reviewing options to proceed with the strategy in more easily digestible chunks.

Investigate the feasibility of an Australian university library portal to facilitate resource sharing and collaborative collection development. A small working group is reviewing technological options and international developments in personal information environments to support an Australian Research Library Network (ARLN). Evaluate options for a national authentication system which will permit students and researchers to access authorised information and databases with a single sign-on. Work is about to begin on a prototype which will require minimal intervention in institutional authentication systems, and minimal work on the part of information providers.

Provide improved access to Australian theses. Seven university libraries have collaborated in a RIEF funded project, Australian Digital Theses, to develop a distributed database of Australian digital theses. From 1 July 2000, CAUL will take on the overall responsibility for the service and the other Australian universities will be invited to participate. [http://www.library.unsw.edu.au/thesis.html]
