Australian Library Week this year commenced with a tour of our central library at Maroubra for thirty-two people from the Coast Centre for seniors. The group was divided into four groups for a tour, which included question and answer time. The second part of the tour included the second floor work area, which is not accessible to the public. People were fascinated at the level of production behind the scenes and now have a better understanding of the labour intensive nature of library work. The visit concluded with morning tea, registration of new members and delivery of a variety of library guides.

We endeavoured to make each location look festive for the week. We purchased a number of Australian Library Week balloons, which we displayed everywhere and gave some to the kids to take home as well. We added to the flavour with coloured streamers. The highlight of the decoration was an exhibition co-ordinated by Russian artist, Efim Novikov. Efim is an artist and art teacher working in Randwick City. The work in the exhibition was from young people aged six to sixteen, with one special piece from a three year old. Many have been impressed with the high standard of creativity, execution and presentation. This exhibition has also been an opportunity for our access and community information librarian to improve links with the Russian community.

In the past we have held an annual book sale on a Saturday. This year as part of Australian Library Week we held a book sale at each of our three locations. We plan on using the proceeds on new shelving for the HSC collection, the junior collection and to assist with the relocation of the junior and toy collections at our central library.

We took the opportunity to have an amnesty on fines during Australian Library Week. Many members took advantage of the opportunity to return items they had either forgotten about or were too scared to return them for fear of the overdue fines!

At Randwick branch we were able to launch our new internet kiosk with the assistance of the Mayor of Randwick, Councillor Dominic Sullivan. The internet kiosk is a coin operated machine similar to those found in shopping centres which will operate on a self-serve basis, requiring no bookings yet a fast and accessible way for people to check their e-mail when in a hurry.

Overall we have accomplished a very successful Australian Library Week for 2000. We are very grateful for the hard work of our volunteers. They impressed us with their enthusiasm for more. We are already planning future collaborative projects.
