## Library workshop backs training network

n 1999 — with assistance from libraries and training organisations from across Australia — CREATE Australia published the library and information services industry training package.

The package built on a strong history of involvement by library and information services in vocational education and training.

Library and information services were one of the first areas outside the traditional trades to see the benefits of structured training. They were also one of the first sectors to offer nationally consistent vocational education and training with competency standards and national curriculum.

'The training package gives library workers the chance to achieve qualifications from Certificate II up to Advanced Diploma', says Cassandra Parkinson, chief executive officer of CREATE.

Training packages give individuals the opportunity to have their existing skills and knowledge formally recognised. They also encourage greater links between workplaces and training institutions by promoting differ-

What's an industry training package? Industry training packages are practical tools for assessment and learning. They provide a framework for awarding learners with nationally recognised qualifications.

The library and information services training package sets out the national vocational education and training qualifications for this sector. All Commonwealth, State, and Territory governments have endorsed the package.

It was developed by CREATE Australia, the national cultural industries training advisory body, with the involvement of industry and training organisations across Australia.

ent learning pathways. Thus, library workers can receive recognition for their experience and have a framework for further skills development.


'We recognise that libraries are complex service agencies, which help people manage information. They need people trained at every level in a combination of technical and client skills. The training package seeks to respond to critical changes in the sector,' says Cassandra.

Training packages are a useful tool for education, training and professional development but they are only as good as what teachers do with them. The real answer lies in the quality of teaching and the opportunities that learners receive.

In 2000, registered training organisations (RTOs) across Australia are working steadily to put new programs in place. Many RTOs are adopting highly innovative approaches to delivering training and assessment.

Now what is needed is an opportunity for all those who are involved in implementing the training package to share their information and expertise. That is a major aim of a national workshop, which CREATE will hold in Canberra on 27 October. Targeted at registered training providers, libraries and resource developers, the workshop will immediately follow the national ALIA conference. It will give participants the chance to compare notes, hear about what is happening and plan for the future.

'We hope that the workshop will be the start of a national library training network and that CREATE can help facilitate ongoing communication. Networking will also help us to update and improve the training package and to learn from the experience of those who are on the ground actually implementing it,' says Cassandra.
