# Library funding boost welcomed Tatura Guardian, 4 July

The Campaspe Shire has welcomed at \$28 000 funding boost to enhance regional library facilities. The funding, which has been made available through the Special Projects Grants for Rural Libraries program, will go towards upgrading resource material in library depots and the Tongala branch library; purchasing new computers for the Echuca Library; and funding multi-cultural events across the shire.

# Library service future clouded

The future of the Glenelg Regional Library Corporation is in doubt with the library's board endorsing a deficit budget for 2000-2001. The library board had two choices: either endorse a deficit budget, illegal under the Local Government Act, or cut services. At the same meeting a report was tabled which indicated the Glenelg Regional Library Corporation was not viable under its current structure. The board agreed that a joint council workshop be held in August/ September to discuss the issue and that representatives of the Local Government Division and the State Library of Victoria be invited to attend.

#### Asbestos in State Library

What is believed to be the biggest asbestos decontamination project ever in Melbourne is taking place at the State Library of Victoria. An estimated 300 tonnes of asbestoscontaminated plaster is being removed from the State Library's domed reading room. The project will take up to twelve months and involve as many as thirty specialist asbestos removalists.

# Library gets \$35 000 grant

Glen Innes and Severn Library has received \$35 300 grant, from the Library Development Grants Scheme, to set up new services for people with disabilities. The funds will be used to modify the building, provide a new wheel chair ramp, automatic doors and an

awning for disabled access. It will also provide adaptive technology and literacy kits for children with learning disabilities.

### Arts industry booms on our \$25-a-week habit

The Age, 13 July, by Raymond Gill

Results of a survey by the Australian Bureau of Statistics and Arts Victoria show that each Victorian household spends about \$25 a week on cultural pursuits. Topping the list of cultural activities is popular music, attracting almost twenty-five per cent of those surveyed, followed by art galleries, musicals and opera, theatre, museums, dance and classical music. In 1997-98 Victorians made 24.6 million visits to local libraries, and borrowed 43.1 million items.

# Library chief wins travel scholarship Daily Advertiser — Wagga, 15 July

Robert Knight, director of the Riverina Regional Library, was recently awarded the Albert Mainerd Scholarship for 2000. The scholarship is awarded by the New South Wales Local Government and Shires Association. Mr Knight will use the scholarship to study the role that public libraries are playing in regional and rural communities overseas where the same decline in population and withdrawal of services evident in Australia is also occurring.

# Council bans primitive view of Aborigines Courier Mail, 18 July, by Lachlan Heywood

A history book which compares the demise of Tasmanian Aborigines with the extinction of animals has been taken off the shelves of Brisbane City Council libraries, leading to calls of censorship in Brisbane libraries. The book was removed in response to a complaint from the Nundah Reconciliation Group, but council opposition says that it is not up to council to dictate the reading material available to Brisbane residents. A council spokesperson says that the book was removed because it contained dated, inaccurate or misleading information and was in poor condition. She said most public libraries in Australia have already withdrawn the work in question. A council report on the issue said that older, out-of-date items in the collection were continually being replaced to ensure holdings reflect current thinking.

# Library users fear for service as opening hours reviewed

Sydney Morning Herald, 19 July, by Geesche Jacobsen

The State Library of New South Wales is reviewing its opening hours after cutting staff numbers by fifteen per cent. While the library management is adamant that the reduction in staff will not effect core services, regular users of the library say they have already noticed a drop in service. A spokesman for the library said that opening hours were still being discussed. He also indicated that the number of people visiting the Macquarie Street buildings had dropped by twenty—one per cent in the past three years, while web access has increased more than 16-fold.

# \$10 000 donation to library Reporter, 19 July

The Logan North Library has received a \$10 000 grant from Com Tech Communications. The grant will be used to purchase a new computer featuring the latest screen reading technology software enabling people with a sight disability to access the internet.

# Four State Library fund-raisers to resign Sydney Morning Herald, 20 July, by Geesche Jacobsen

Four members of the State Library Foundation's board have quit after two members had raised concerns that its fund-raising activities had ground to a halt. Former chairperson of the board, Alice Oppen, wrote to the state librarian saying the board's ability to fulfil its duties was 'severely compromised by bureaucratic restraints'.

# Library closes the book on treasures few want to open Sydney Morning Herald, 28 July, by Geesche Jacobsen

The library of the NSW Parliament is disposing of more than half of its rare 19th century book collection to make room for new volumes. About sixty per cent of the library's collection is to be disposed of. The books were first offered free to the State Library and the Powerhouse Museum, what they do not want will be sold through internet bookseller, Alibris. Books valued at ap-

proximately \$366 000 have been given to the State Library and the Powerhouse Museum.

# Cybraries will gather no dust

A recent British survey suggests that by 2004 most scholarly journals will be in electronic form, with access to the journals via subscriptions which raises questions about access and ownership. # Charges over art book scam

West Australian, 3 August by Vivienne Stanton

The theft of hundreds of books worth approximately \$44 000 has been uncovered in Fremantle. Police allege that a man removed the bar codes, date slips and loan pockets from 884 glossy art books, ripped out library-stamped pages, and sold the books to second-hand bookshops in the Fremantle area. The man was charged with fraud and 884 counts of stealing.

# City girding up for a host of smart babies Moreland Sentinel, 7 August by Gosia Kaszubska

Moreland Council libraries have produced 2300 bookstart kits that will be given to every baby born in the area in the next year. The kits include a colourful picture book for babies, a booklet on the best ways to develop children's reading skills and a list of recommended books for babies and toddlers. Maternal and child health nurses will distribute the kits when they visit new parents in Moreland.
