## Obituary: Josephine McGovern

## Parliamentary librarian

osephine McGovern was born in Camperdown, Victoria on 14 January 1924 and while she spent most of her life away from Camperdown she always maintained close connections with that community. She first left Camperdown to undertake secondary school studies as a boarder at St Ann's College at Warrnambool and this was followed by primary teacher training at the Teacher's College at the University of Melbourne. After short teaching appointments in Camperdown, Cobden and Swan Hill she returned to the University of Melbourne where she graduated Bachelor of Arts in 1949. Then followed three years teaching at Terang High School during which time Josephine completed a Diploma of Education by correspondence

In early 1953 at the age of 29, Josephine McGovern resigned from the Department of Education ending a promising teaching career. She sailed on the Otranto to London and was there for the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. One of the many highlights of this trip was a fourteen week tour of the Continent with friends in an old Austin London Taxicab fondly known as *Elegance*. She returned home on a French ship assisting her passage by teaching English to intending migrants.

On her return to Melbourne Josephine obtained a teaching appointment at Swinburne Technical College but soon took the opportunity to move across to the college library. There was then an appointment at the State Library of Victoria during which time she studied part-time to obtain the Registration Certificate of the Library Association of Australia and in 1958 she was appointed female assistant in the Library of the Parliament of Victoria.

Josephine was the first female professional appointed to the staff of the Library of the Parliament of Victoria. At that time there were no female MPs. The Parliament of Victoria was a man's world with almost no room for women and by 1970 when Josephine was appointed the librarian it had changed little (one female Member!). This was the first female parliamentary librarian appointment in Australia. It was a difficult environment for a woman but she succeeded against the odds, earning the respect of Members. Always addressed as Miss McGovern by the staff she was affectionately known as Josie behind her back. Among many achievements she was responsible for commencing the rationalisation of the collection with the new Monash and LaTrobe Universities being the beneficiaries, the appointment of the first research officers to the library staff and for overseeing the superb facsimile reprint of William Strutt's Victoria the Golden in 1981. During this time she

was an active member of the Library Association of Australia, the Association of Parliamentary Librarians of Australasia and the Australian Society of Indexers. Josephine still found time to return to the family property at Camperdown to cook for the shearers at shearing time.

During her time at the Parliament of Victoria she continued to travel. Josephine loved to visit relatives in the United Kingdom and also made trips to America, Canada, Russia, China, Japan, the Middle East, India, Nepal and Turkey. She was planning another trip later this year hoping to include Portugal for the first time. Her fondness for travel and her commitment to the Roman Catholic faith is evidenced by her attendance at three consecutive performances of the Oberammergau Passion Plays that are only performed every ten years.

Retirement in 1986 provided the opportunity to pursue, even more vigorously, her interests in the arts, community activities and golf. She continued her long-term association with the University of Melbourne as a committee member of the Convocation Committee, the Graduate Union, the Graduate Association and Graduate House. Josephine was a member of the Lyceum Club, Soroptimists, Dromana Ladies Probus, Mornington Peninsula Regional Gallery and a life member of the National Gallery of Victoria. She was also an active member of three golf clubs. Josephine enjoyed good health until her sudden death at home on 2 April 2001. She is buried in the Camperdown cemetery.
