ccording to Anne Floyd, convenor of the ALIA 2001 TAFE Libraries Conference, a great deal.

'TAFE librarians not only have the information management and retrieval skills that are expected of our profession, but also have an intimate knowledge of the industry in which we work. 

r John Foster becomes the third president of the Australian National Section of IBBY — the International Board on Books for Young People. He succeeds Ena Noël, foundation president 1966–1991, and Juliana Bayfield who was president from 1991 to 2001.

IBBY, allied to UNESCO, is an international non-profit organisation consisting of some sixty member nations. In Australia the member is ALIA. All who work for the organisation do so in a voluntary capacity to bring books and young people together, to encourage the young to read, to look at and to listen to the best that is on offer.

John comes to the position of president with a wealth of knowledge and experience in the area of literature for young people. He teaches children's literature at the University of South Australia and is a senior lecturer in the School of International Studies. He is director of the Centre for Children's Literature and convenes the Children's Literature Major at that university.

John has been awarded fellowships

from the International Youth Library in Munich and the International Institute for children's Literature in Osaka, Japan. He has co-authored three books on aspects of children's literature, has written nu-

merous articles for British, American, Austrian and Australian journals and regularly reviews children's books for two Australian journals.

He was welcomed as president by Ena at the national Hans Christian Andersen Dinner. The dinner which was held recently in Adelaide to honour the birthday of Hans Christian Andersen and International Children's Book Day was a fitting occasion for Australian IBBY to
