Are we losing the battle?

The first Riverina Reading Group, chaired by Marsha Reilly, met on Thursday 6 September to discuss the article by Professor Ross Harvey 'Losing the quality battle in Australian education for librarianship'. (*ALJ* February 2001, pp15–22). A lively and at times robust debate ensued among the group of practitioners, managers and academics (including Ross Harvey).

The key discussion themes revolved around two of the three key questions from Harvey's paper: What is our field? and What is our product? However the most interesting discussions surrounded the vexed questions of our role definition where we touched on librarian as information manager, educator of users, information 'techo' and 'web wiz'. Other related issues included are IT professionals hijacking our agenda or do we allow this to happen? That clients have so many and confusing information choices and that librarians play a vital role in the evaluation and targeting of appropriate

resources, irrespective of format, was also raised.

On library education, the need for targeted education for specialist librarians, for example law librarians, was discussed. The role and training of library technician and librarian raised the issues of the need for broad liberal education as a key starting point for librarians. Two people who had technician training discussed the practical nature of technicians training. It was agreed that technicians seemed to have defined their roles clearly and were active professionally. The need for library graduates to be industry ready with the skills for the contemporary library was hotly debated between the academics and the library directors.

Library directors made reference to the lack of time, which enables research to take place, and that academics need to increasingly draw library directors into their research. Library restructuring and diminished library staff numbers, along with increasing client demand provide big challenges for directors to undertake research. Professional doctorates were suggested as a way forward

for linking work with research and credentials.
