Intranetting was the title of the final ALIA Schools seminar for 2001. This was held in October and focused on digital copyright issues, the commercial software applications available for intranets and three models showing how library staff had contributed to the development of intranets within their schools. Participants' evaluation comments were very positive.

The 2001 committee has made a substantial contribution to the professional development of teacher librarians in Victoria and looks forward to another successful year in 2002.

Intranetting

Intranets are becoming an indispensable part of information management in modern-day schools. So it is important that school librarians, the information specialists, become involved. Because of this, ALIA Schools Victoria conducted a oneday seminar, at Star of the Sea College Gardenvale, to introduce some issues and practicalities involved with managing intranets.

The day started with a talk from Ann Grieve, manager of copyright services for the Victorian Education Department, who discussed in particular the implications of the new *Copyright Amendment (Digital Agenda) Act 2000* for loading information on intranets. As usual with copyright there are dangers and protections and its important to know just how far you can safely go and still provide an useful service.

This was followed by two product demonstrations: Masterfile and Impaq. Both systems can provide a great service but it is important to carefully assess the school's needs before committing to major outlays.

After lunch, we had demonstrations of how intranets work at three different schools: Star of the Sea College, Santa Maria College Northcote and St Joseph's College Mildura. Participants rated the day as very good to excellent and said that it had inspired them to take a more prominent role in the functioning of their school's intranet.

The WA Forum recognised that there were several services which were once provided by the WA Branch that were too important to be lost with the demise of the old branch structure. Those services are: the FA Sharr Medal, Library and Information Week, the monthly newsletter *Biblia*, and continuing professional development activities. The WA Forum was established to ensure that these services continue to be delivered, and also to provide a forum for discussion and debate on issues affecting or of interest to all ALIA members in Western Australia.

Each service has a small team that operates under the guidance of the WA Forum. The *Biblia* team publishes a monthly newsletter in electronic and hardcopy formats. Projects undertaken in the last six months include: the establishment of a professional reading group with regular meetings; collaborative monthly projects with CAVAL to bring knowledgeable presenters to Perth; 'Where do we go from here? Librarians moving out of the library' for careers beyond the library; and 'Managers do things right: Leaders do the right things' leadership seminar.

The WA Forum has achieved much in a short time since 1 July 2001. The services it provides will continue to benefit all ALIA members in Western Australia.
