Public Libraries Australia initiative

Public libraries, library associations and local government around Australia have all joined forces in a collaborative effort to establish a formal body for national representation that actively represents, advocates and promotes the interests of all public libraries in Australia.

The initiative builds upon the 2001 study, sponsored by the Council of Australian State Libraries, which investigated the business case for creating a new national body to represent public libraries. The study showed a strong support for the initiative amongst the public library stakeholders.

At a meeting earlier this year in Adelaide the crucial elements in forming a peak representative body were discussed and the following outcomes were achieved:

- 'Public Libraries Australia' was the agreed name for the proposed network.
- A business plan framework was developed.
- It was decided that a project manager's position will be created, funded from a seeding fund.
- An interim steering committee was appointed comprising: Lynne Makin (chairperson, Upper Murray Regional Library); Ian Chalmers (Australian Local Government Association); Councillor Beverley Giegerl (NSW Local Government Association); Lea Giles-Peters (State Library of Queensland); Robert Knight (Wagga Wagga City Council); David Toll (National Library of Australia); and Chris Williams (State Library of New South Wales).

The committee is now working on establishing Public Libraries Australia as a separate legal entity and recruiting a project manager. The next stage of the project will involve development of a membership model and branding for Public Libraries Australia.

Information obtained through the responses to the discussion paper has provided the base for the next phase in the work of the PWG. Following indepth analysis of responses the group met in July to develop a series of recommendations to present to the August meeting of the Board of Directors for decision about the future direction of the project including further consultations prior to the NPC.
