opening words of Dagmar Schmidmaier and then ALIA president Alan Bundy at the welcome reception, that she was on the threshold of something unique.

Robyn Cammack, also of the ABS, said that she had given up on going to ALIA biennial conferences as much of what she usually heard had been said before and the 'gems' were far between. This conference was perfect, she said, for people in mid- and high-career. To these people the conference delivered energy, enthusiasm, and a perspective of their own industry from outside that will prove invaluable to service development.

Helen Mandl of Wollongong University says 'I think people appreciated the different nature of the conference, the calibre of the speakers and the different viewpoints that came across. It seems to have generated some momentum and it will be interesting to see where things go'.

Stephen Churm from Southern Scene said that the space and his new look walk-through stand worked well. He commented on the good cross-section of delegates at the conference.

Shirley Forster from Altarama Systems was showcasing two new products at the trade exhibition and said it was great to be able to get these in front of senior members of the profession.

Ian McCallum, co-moderator of the Issues Forum with Libraries Alive! partner Sherrey Quinn, reckons that 'if understanding that our present is a pre-requisite for powering our future, then ... ALIA 2002 was a resounding success.' In his post-event report posted to the Issues Forum e-list, Ian commented that 'devising a conference that addressed for the most part in a single stream and by people from "outside" libraries was a dangerous distance from our comfortable format...' Ian went on to note that 'in their closing remarks, first

Neil McLean and then Joyce Kirk pointed out that incremental change is no longer enough, that transformational change will be needed to secure sustainability for the library sector. Building bridges with natural partners outside our profession, is now imperative — and well and truly on the information agenda.

'It was a challenging, confronting conference. What we do with what we learned is obviously up to us. Joyce may well prove prescient in her suspicion that ALIA 2002 will in hindsight be seen as a watershed,' he said.

Okay, it was interesting, but can you use it: Macquarie University and the University of Technology, Sydney library staff will use the conference content as a catalyst for a strategic planning day later this year.

ALIA NSW Forum held a special meeting on 27 August to look at how, as a group, they can further the information agenda, using papers from the final conference session as their starting point.

And the wash up?

Conferences are big business and they are risky business. ALIA 2002 will not return a profit to the Association, but it has been a very worth-while investment. Those that wagered on the difference and turned up at Darling Harbour won the most, leaving personally inspired, stimulated and informed. Those that didn't will feel the benefits as they ripple through the organisation. You can still be part of this exciting process. Read the papers on the website, join in conversations about the agenda for the information profession.

The lessons of the conference are many, but the important one is that in each of us rests the power to shape our future and that it will be shaped by our own action — or inaction. Either way, we will be responsible, so we better make it something of which we can be proud.
